THOUGHTS OF FARMER RON

Hello Fertile. I will start this letter by saying that at our June City Council meeting, we will take up debating and hopefully signing an agreement that Fertile along with Hanlontown, will do normal maintenance on the new trail between our two communities. This includes mowing, sweeping,

trash pick up and any other tasks to keep the trail clean and ready for use by walkers and bikers. Any needed repairs to the trail would be the responsibility of the county. Since we all want it to last without repairs (except weather related), it probably will be made of concrete instead of asphalt. I will know more about this after our next meeting.

Is this year going to be another 1934? I am going to Plainfield, Wisconsin to talk to the irrigation people. That is in the Central Sands Potato country. I need to find out if our irrigation pump can be fixed or if we need to think about a different one. It's a little early yet, but we are rapidly getting to the time when the crops will be using a lot of water. It is hard to grow a crop without it. Just trying to keep my options open.

I see that they cultivated the organic corn on the Colby Land a second time. It looks much better than the first. However, it still will be a failure. The weeds are still in the row and they will be as tall as the corn. The second reason is that muck soils are naturally low on potash. That is why the Hefty Bros, advice on building up the K level doesn't work on muck. Potash can leach out of the soil just like nitrogen because there isn't any clay particles for the K to attach too. Come fall the stalks will be weak and fall over in the first wind. Just saving! With the big push by the Biden Administration for all electric cars, semi-trucks and farm tractors so we don't use fossil fuels, how are we going to generate the electricity to charge them? With electric cars, we wouldn't need ethanol. Where will that five billion bushels of corn go? What will happen to small, under 10 acre, growers, who will no longer be able to use tillers and small tractors? How soon will people be getting hungry for lack of food produced? Just thinking.

There is an old saying that I live by. "For every action, there is a reaction". We need a little more brain and a little less mouth from our politicians.

Cooks page by: Tammy Waddington Rhubarb-Raspberry Jam

6 c. fresh or frozen (unsweetened) chopped rhubarb 4 c. sugar

- 1 Tbs. lemon juice
- 2 c. fresh raspberries or 12 oz. pkg. frozen loose pack raspberries

3 oz. pkg. raspberry gelatin

In large kettle or dutch oven combine rhubarb, sugar and lemon juice. Lest stand 15-20 minutes or till sugar is moistened. Bring to a boil. Boil, uncovered, for 10 minutes, stirring often. Add raspberries; return to boiling. Boil hard for 5-6 minutes or until thick, stirring often. Remove from heat. Add gelatin; stir until dissolved. Ladle into hot, clean half-pint jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Wipe jar rims; adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath for 15 minutes (start timing when water boils). YIELD: 5 to 6 half pints.

Strawberry-Rhubarb Cobbler

6 c. sliced rhubarb (about 1-1/2 pounds)
1/2 c. granulated sugar
1 pk. (3 oz.) strawberry flavored gelatin
1 pkg. (9 oz.) yellow cake mix
1/3 c. unsalted butter, melted
2 tsp. confectioners' sugar, for garnish
Whipped topping, optional

Heat oven to 350°. Coat an 11x7x2-in. baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. Place rhubarb in dish and sprinkle sugar then gelatin. Sprinkle cake mix over gelatin then drizzle with 3/4 c. water. Stir in the melted butter. Bake for 50 minutes. Remove and cool on wire rack for 10-15 mins. Serve warm or room temperature. Dust with confectioners' sugar.

Tips from the olden days!

A book from 1951 says... to keep worms off cabbage take 1 pint saltpeter and 3 pints of salt. Dissolve in 6 gallons of water. Sprinkle on cabbage as needed.

Strawberry Shortcake, Old Way (1889)

Flour, 3 1/2 c.; baking powder, 3 tea-spoonfuls; butter, or rice lard, 1 table-spoonful (rounding); sweet milk. Directions-Stir the baking powder into the flour and sift; work in the butter smoothly; then use milk enough to have a soft dough; roll out 1 inch thick, bake. When done have the strawberries mixed with sugared cream; split the cake with a sharp knife, spread lightly with butter the lower half, then put in a thick layer of the fruit, replacing the top, and covering the top also.

Fruit Flies?

Scatter a few **mint or basil sprigs** near fresh fruit –they hate the small. Rub a little **alcohol** on counter next to bananas or ripening melon, tomato, or avocado. Pour **apple cider** into a jar or bowl-they will drown.

Garden Tips

Pouring or spraying a little white vinegar on offending weeds will shrivel the weeds. Just be careful of your flowers.

Homemade Herbicide

In a bucket, combine equal parts vinegar, table salt, and dish soap for a weed killing solution that can't be stopped. Put it in a cheap spray bottle for easy use.

THE OLE SWIMMING HOLE by Neil Kuns

Small-town North Iowa in the 1930's didn't afford many swimming pools. There was one at the Y in Mason City and Clear Lake was swimmable but ten miles away from home. We did have the Winnebago River and the creek that ran south of the public park. The "big kids" got to swim above the dam but not until they could prove their ability to swim across the river and back without stopping. Before that we went off to the little rill south of the park for relief from the heat unless our mothers took down to "Clay Banks" about a mile down-river from town. Learning to swim entails learning to float, how to breathe without inhaling or swallowing water, and how to propel oneself. Floating is really a matter of learning the truth that one will float if the lungs are inflated. It's a matter of trust rather than technique. Before we learned that we had the help of inflated rubber inner tubes on which we either hung or sat. In still water we used our arms as oars and paddle around. This was the beginning of understanding propulsion. The ole swimming hole in the creek south of the park was not still water unless the river was really low. It tumbled over the rocks before settling in a two-foot deep pool for fifteen feet before bubbling on its way to the east. This is where I learned to swim. We waded upstream to the shallow moving water, plopped down into the flow and let the current carry us ten or fifteen feet until it slowed. We dog-paddled like crazy as we bobbed along and finally became confident that we could move without the current. I have swum laps in a pool six days a week for over thirty-five years. It is a large part of what has kept me alive. It all began over eighty years ago here in the ole swimming hole of this little creek where I learned how to swim.
