WATCH BURIED 20 YEARS IS RETURNED TO OWNER

Whereabouts of the owner located by interested friends.

Some weeks ago the Times carried the story of how Peter Merkel, while planting corn on his farm found a gold Elgin Watch which had been lost for nearly twenty years ago by Ben Miller, who at the time farmed the land. Neighbors helped Mr. Miller in hunting for the watch at that time but in vain. At the time the story was published the whereabouts of the original owner were not known here.

However, through the Times, the owner was found, and the following letter received by Peter Merkel is self-explanatory:

Fertile. Iowa. July 12, 1929 Through the honesty and good will of mankind in general I am now in possession of a watch that I lost nineteen years ago, which I long since had despaired of ever seeing again, and I feel very grateful to all the good people who so kindly remembered me when the lost watch was found.

Especially do I want to think Mr. Peter Merkel who actually found the watch, and Mr. Schlawin, who was my near neighbor when the watch was lost, and remembered the circumstances when it again was found: and Mr. and Mrs. Knisely of Rockwell, lowa, through whom I first learned that the long watch had been found.

Friends, I thank you,

Sincerely, BEN MILLER

Mr. Miller came to Klemme a few weeks ago and was given the watch. He learned of the finding of the watch through Mr. Knisley at Rockwell, a Times subscriber, who sent Mr. Miller a clipping of the paper. The watch is of special value to Mr. Miller as it was his father's watch and was given to him by his mother when Mr. Miller was a boy thirteen years old. The Times is happy to know it served as the connecting link of the story of locating the owner.

(An Editor's note: Ben Miller was my son-in-law's (Dan Miller) great grandpa. Mr. Knisley was my husband's great uncle. What a small world.)

FERTILE GOSPEL MISSION

Taken from 1956 Fertile Centennial Book

The Fertile Gospel Mission, an interdenominational organization, is made up of believers from different denominations who have as their chief interest the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ at home and in foreign field—"In Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the uttermost parts of the Earth" according to Acts 1:8. This group, after having met from time to time in the homes or in the upper room of the pickle factory of Fertile for several years, decided to buy a building. In 1937, they purchased the former Fertile schoolhouse and incorporated under the name Fertile Gospel Mission.

For the most part, they have not had a resident pastor but have conducted Sunday school and a Fellowship Missionary Society with the help at times of visiting evangelists and pastors as well as missionaries on furlough. At present however, they have a resident pastor, the Rev. Buford Hall, who has served the call since August, 1955.

They have several missionaries on foreign fields whom they help to support: Mrs. Pointer (nee Bessie Tallackson) in Africa, Miss Mabel Elthon in the Canal Zone, Rev. and Mrs. Paul Shook (nee Vada Eikenbary) in Japan, Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Nyhus (nee Ruth Elthon) in Formosa, and Rev. and Mrs. James Beasley (nee Catherine Jorgenson) now home on furlough from Japan. Miss Jenny Jorgenson, a former missionary to Costa Rica, and Mr. and Mr. P. K. Myhre, former missionaries to Ecuador, are now retired from the field. Besides the foreign missionaries, there are several pastors and wives who fellowshipped with this group before entering the ministry, and are now preaching in the United States. Among them are Rev. Glenn Smith of Colorado, Rev. and Mrs. Oscar Ouverson (nee Hazel Stevens) of While Hall, Illinois, Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Levang (nee Silence Seglem) of West Union, Iowa, and Rev. Milton Scoepf of Ortonville. Minnesota.

March 1, Moving Day Neil L. Kuns

March 1, 1995

Growing up in a farming community one became very aware of the broad cycles of life. Grain farmers carefully observed the prime times for preparing and planting their fields, as well as the periods of harvesting the crops. Fortunately oats ripened before the beans and the corn didn't harden until even later in the fall. Animal farmers were subject to different cycles of nature. The swine farmer set up his brooding houses sometime in the spring, and soon a veritable "pigsburgh" populated the field in which the sows were nurturing their bloods of little piglets. How can a hog which is so cute when it is little and pink become so ugly when it matures? Perhaps pigs ponder the same question about us humans.

Speaking of humans, there was another yearly cycle which played out the first of every March. Caesar was warned to avoid the ides of March, but public school teachers had to be wary of the first day of the month.

This sequence was largely a function of the re-distribution of wealth brought about by the Great Depression. Many families who owned or were buying their "places" (the way they referred to their farms) in the 1920's were unable to keep up the taxes and mortgage payments when the price of their produce plummeted, or the drought of the "dust-bowl" years dealt them a deadly one-two punch. Banks re-possessed their properties including the fields, equipment, livestock, the out-buildings and the family home. Some forward thinking or lucky people who had their wealth in more liquid forms bought the distressed properties from the banks and became landlords overnight. Landed, they were; loved they were not! Some of their names were spoken with a hiss by the dispossessed. Be that as it may, those who by personality and preparation were more suited to being farmers than any other occupation found themselves in the un-enviable position of being *tenant* farmers. Some leased the land, hoping to pay the rent from selling the harvest. Others were "share-croppers" who agreed to return a specified portion of the harvest for the right to till the land.

An owner finds it much more difficult to pull up stakes and move than does a renter. A tenant farmer who for whatever reason thought he could do better or strike a better deal with a different land owner might move every year if he could persuade his wife and family that it was a good idea. The youngsters who started in first grade at Fertile and graduated from high school twelve years later were for the most part the offspring of land owners or townspeople.

Every year on the last school day of February we would say "good-bye" to some of our classmates and perhaps never see them again. The first school day of March would often bring some new student to occupy the empty desk. They might also sleep in the same bedroom out on the farm. It was difficult for the teacher, and certainly no picnic for the student to change schools two-thirds through the school year. For the teacher and those of us who had been in the class all year it was only one or two new names to learn. For the new student there were a new teacher and a new roomful of classmates. Most of us tried to make it as easy on the "newbies" as possible. If he were an athletically gifted guy or she were a "cosmetically advantaged" (good looking) girl this integration process was easy. This was really never any great challenge, because almost everyone in a small town is friendly. One such village announced its population as "397 friendly people, and a few old grouches." That could have been Fertile, Iowa in the 1940's.

He told the story of a call received in the terrible winter of 1936. It was bitter cold, a blizzard, so he asked the caller to meet him four miles from his house as he couldn't possibly make it through to their yard. The caller replied that it was much too cold to get the horses out. It wasn't even an emergency call!

Dr. Olson served Northwood for 50 years, opening his office in 1930 and retiring in 1980, covering the days of horse and buggy to current day transportation.

As you can imagine, many positive and happy occurrences happened during this period delivering 1,500 babies with two –thirds of them in their home during the first half of his practice. Medicines truly improved to help him as he practiced. Doctors were virtual pharmacies in the early 1930's as medicines in drug stores were limited. Doctors had to learn about medicines, their effects and cures, even though there weren't many at the time. More than once an ailing person left his office with a bottle of pink liquid, almost a sure-fire, get well item. It was a combination of a relaxant and a sedative. Many times a doctor had to be a psychologist too by "talking" a person into getting well.

His pay was sometimes given in eggs and produce, and much of the time he wasn't paid at all. Office calls were \$1.00. He worked day and night with open office hours on Wednesday and Saturday nights.

There were negative aspects of his job of course. There were the two train/car crashes in the 1950's including adults and children. His son Russell E. Olson recalls accompanying his father to the site of one of the accidents. Dr. Olson walked down the tracks, picked up each body and examined them. When he came to the last one, the baby, he realized he had delivered them all. He knelt, said a prayer, and then wept uncontrollably.

The scarlet fever and polio epidemics were major illnesses during his years of practice. Quarantines were posted for diphtheria. In those days nobody paid much attention to hepatitis—they called it yellow jaundice.

Dr. Olson served Northwood and surrounding areas of 14 miles including Carpenter, Myrtle, south of Manly and south of Albert Lea.

I hope this trip down memory lane will be enjoyed by many of you who remember Dr. Russell Olson.

1/2 lb, bacon, cooked & crumbled

¾ cup brown sugar

1 (1 lb) can kidney beans

1 (1 lb) can lima beans
