Florence Nye:

'I've had a fairly level career'

Forest City community schools will lose another longtime teacher at the end of this school year as Florence Nye of Fertile retires after 26¹/₂ years in teaching.

Florence got her start after two years at Waldorf College and spent the last 16 years of her career teaching to elementary students at the Fertile and Forest City attendance centers.

"Teaching has been my career objective as long as I can remember," Florence said. "Even going through school at Bode, I remember wanting to be a teacher."

She graduated from high school at Bode in 1939 and went to Waldorf for two years (at that time it took only a two year certificate to teach) in pursuing her dream.

Her first year out of Waldorf, Florence took a job teaching fifth and sixth grade at Fertile for superintendent A. Grooters. That lasted only two years as she moved to Albert City where she had the chance

to teach just one grade—sixth. Again she moved after a year at Albert City, this time to Coon Rapids where she taught fourth graders for $2^{1/2}$ years. It was during this teaching stint that her fiance, Max, returned from the service and the two were married in 1945.

Florence moved to Max's hometown of Fertile after completing the first semester of the 1945-46 school year at Coon Rapids. After a semester out of teaching, she took the fourth and fifth grade job at Fertile.

"There was quite a lull in the number of teachers just after the war," Florence said. "I hadn't really intended on teaching after I got married. There weren't many married women teachers at that time, you know. After two years, I did get out of teaching until 1966."

During that time, Florence raised three boys and helped in the family grocery store—Nye's Royal Blue Market in Fertile.

"When my youngest son started kindergarten, 1 decided to go in to teaching again and got on with the Forest City school system as a Title I reading teacher for grades four through six," Florence said. "After two years, I took on the fifth grade at Fertile where I stayed until they moved fifth grade to Forest City in 1977."

Since that time, she has taught a fifth grade class at Forest City.

Being from Fertile, Florence hated to see the Fertile attendance center closed. "I guess I could see both the pros and the cons but you hate to see a school leave the town." Florence said. "That's something that's over now so I guess we have to forget it."

What Florence won't soon forget is the many elementary students she has taught over the years. "I'm sure I'll miss the kids," she said, "and my association with the other teachers. But there are advantages to being retired. I won't be bored by any means."

With her new found time, Florence hopes to spend some time working on things at home that have been pushed into the background. She'll also have more time for her husband, Max, an employee of the lowa Department of Transportation.

"I've had a fairly level career," Plorence said. "Now it's time to let in a younger teacher. I hope the new teacher enjoys teaching as much as I have."

The name Nettie (Orahood) Emery may ring a bell with some of you. She was born October 6, 1868 in Butler County and in later years became known as Northwood's "Annie Oakley".

She married George Milton Emery in 1887 and in their early married years homesteaded 160 acres near Twin Falls, Idaho. The requirement was to build a cabin and live there for two years, but had no requirement to farm the land, so they didn't. They lived off the land by hunting and fishing to put food on the table.

The summer gave them ample time to ride their horses north past what is now Sun Valley, living on fish and game. On their way back to the cabin during fall they diverted to the hills looking for big game such as elk to supply food for the winter.

Even after her husband died in 1929, she was still shooting and hunting—just not on horseback anymore. During her days in Northwood she was an avid pheasant hunter. She recruited her 12 year old Grandson George Dwelle to accompany her on Sunday hunting outings. His job was to drive (remember he is 12) the country roads while Nettie "rode shotgun". Birds were flushed from the roadsides and Nettie fired her Winchester .22 rifle knocking the heads off pheasants—even from far distances. They usually had two or three plump pheasants for their Sunday evening meal.

Some local residents did not approve of the Sunday hunting especially when out of season. Nettie would wear Sunday afternoon attire consisting of a full-length dress. Once in a while a car would approach and so she tucked the newly shot bird in the folds of her big skirt. George loved these Sunday afternoons. She also used her. 22 rifle to get rid of the pesky pigeons on the roof of her house in Northwood. Time and laws have certainly changed haven't they?

Nettie Emery died September 6, 1958 and is buried in Sunset Rest Cemetery. Her grandson George Dwelle said of Nettie—we had no idea until years later that their sweet old "Grandma Great" who always had treats and toys for them was such a "character".

The Winchester .22 rifle was donated to the WCHS by her Great Grandson's Richard and Robert Dwelle. Until Next time.....

I stopped at the Market and bought some items, but goat meat they did not have.

In March, I will be a presenter for three Gardening classes for the spring N.I.A.C.C. education series. I will be in Lake Mills on March 12, Forest City, March 16, And Garner, March 26. The classes will be two hours long from 6:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. The class will be geared for novice gardeners who are just starting to those that would like to grow for a profit, like me.

Talking about growing for a profit, I probably wouldn't know till spring if I am going to garden and grow a few onions or just garden. This year they had about 60 members in their Bounty Box program. Next year, they would like to boost that up to 120 to 150. If they achieve that, growing for North Iowa Fresh will keep me busy.

This is my last letter for 2019. As long as surgery recovery goes well, I will be back writing for 2020. If you see this before Thanksgiving, Happy Thanksgiving. If not, Merry Christmas. Lemon Fudge

1 - 10 oz. bag plus 1 cup white chocolate chips

1 - 14 oz. can sweetened condensed milk

2 Tbs. butter, softened

1 1/2 tsp. lemon extract

Line an 8x8-inch.baking pan with foil [make sure foil hangs over edges so serve as handles]. Spray with cooking spray. In a 4-cup microwave measuring cup, mix chocolate chips, milk and butter. Microwave uncovered on high 1 to 2 minutes, stirring every 30 seconds, until chips are almost melted. Stir in lemon extract and if you choose a small amount of yellow food coloring. Pour mixture into prepared baking pan. Place in refrigerator for 2 hours or overnight before cutting.

Tiger Butter

1 pkg. (12 squares) of white almond bark 1 c. creamy peanut butter 1 cup chocolate chips

Microwave the white almond bark until all melted. Then add 1 c. creamy peanut butter and stir well. Pour mixture into a 9x13 buttered pan.

In another bowl melt the chocolate chips. Then swirl melted chips through mixture in pan. Cool - cut in squares. This is best at room temperature.

Eggs Loraine
