From the Worth County Eagle

Thursday, February 10, 1881.

Snow 3 feet deep in the woods. It took Lake Mills mail carrier from Saturday until Monday to reach Northwood. Then he walked six miles.

On the line of road from Mason City to Austin, drifts in some places are said to be as high as the telegraph poles.

The railroads are all blockaded. Possibly the B.C.R. +N. may get trains to Albert Lea by Saturday night if they have no bad luck.

The roads have been so blocked that no horse could travel, and the Sheriff has been traveling the county on snow shoes summoning the jury for the February term. This is a novel way of traveling in this age.

Last Friday afternoon, Joe Fleming of Kensett, came to Northwood on horseback for a coffin for the only child of Charles Christenson. It was late on his arrival and he did not think it expedient to venture out as was so near dark and he remained overnight. Our readers all know what a terrible day Saturday was and was unsafe for one to be out on the road so Joe waited until Sunday morning. Then it was impossible for him to get his horse out of the barn on account of the deep snow. He made up his mind that the trip must be made. He had the coffin fastened securely to his back and started on foot during that severe snow storm. He arrived at home in safety.

So what do you think? Did we have a bad winter? Until next time...

Spence and Vera (Van Hoosen) were married on March 7, 1930. Their courtship had been interrupted in the summers when Spence went to Minnesota to raise flax. In the winters he sometimes worked for his father as a hired man. His wages were a dollar a day plus room and board. This was a nice arrangement as they got to spend time together until he displeased his boss and got fired.

He was a farmer, she a school teacher. In the 1920's you graduated from high school, attended a summer teacher training, then began teaching. Like many farmers during the hard depression years they rented, but in 1944 purchased the Van Hoosen farm five and a half miles southwest of Fertile. At the time rural electricity and running water were promising conveniences, so their refrigerator operated on kerosene.

On the new farm, in addition to raising turkeys, hogs, sheep, cattle and chickens, Spence and Vera raised their children – Spence Jr., LaVonne (Vonnie,), Arlyn (Arlee) and Jenny. The three oldest graduated from Fertile High. After school reorganization Jenny completed high school in Ventura.

The Abrams story is a good follow-up to the April Reminder. Spence and Vera accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as their Savior at special meetings of the Fertile Gospel Mission held in the pickle factory. Regular church attendance, Bible reading and prayer became a part of the family practices.

Spence and Vera celebrated their 71stst wedding anniversary before Vera died in November of 2001. Spence followed her in May of 2003. They are buried in Grant Center Cemetery south of Fertile.

THOUGHTS OF FARMER RON

Good Morning Fertile, First of all, I would like to say THANK YOU to everyone who sent a card, said a prayer, visited, or asked about me

during this ordeal. For those of you who do not know, I had knee surgery on January 22. They had to go back in on January 25 to clean out an embolism on that knee. On January 26, a blood clot left my leg, went through my heart and ended up in my lungs. This pulmonary aneurism sent me off to the I.C.U. of Iowa Methodist Hospital in Des Moines for lots of oxygen and blood thinners. After a week, I was moved to I.O.O.F Home of Mason City for rehab for three weeks. When Medicare ran out I moved to my girlfriend's house under the care of Cerro Gordo Public Health. I am now doing out-patient physical therapy at the I.O.O.F. Home and should be done the week of April 24. I will be moving back home during Holy Week . I don't want to forget to thank Don Larsen for blowing the snow off of my driveway and Cindy Peters for being, well Cindy Peters.

After spending as much time as I did in the hospitals and nursing home, I have real appreciation for all medical workers, from the surgeons to the aides. Everyone is needed and they don't get enough people saying thank you. I want to especially thank a P.A. in Clarion who made the call for me to have a cat scan of my lung to find the blood clot. Had I gone home instead of Des Moines, I would now be a permanent resident of the cemetery. It was that close. Believe me, I value life. Maintaining my health so I can serve others is so important to me.

Thank you Holly for grabbing the reins and going ahead with the Fertile Days Celebration planning. I approve of everything that you did.

You are probably wondering if I am going to have my other knee done. The answer is yes, but not until December. I am having genetic blood testing in August. This is quite common in people, think factor five. The surgeon will then know what precautions to take. I will be on Pradaxa until August. Thank you V.A.

I will be growing crops on about one and one half acres this year for North Iowa Fresh and the Clear Lake Farmers Market. I just can't keep my fingers out of the soil. Please Mr. Weatherman, not another 2018.

Until next time, thank a veteran for the freedoms that you enjoy, a farmer for the food on your plate, and above all, thank God for your daily blessings.

Kuns Super Service, Gone but not Forgotten

Decades of neglect finally took their toll recently when the building that held the last version of Kuns Super Service collapsed under the weight of heavy winter snow. With the debris cleared, the site returns to the way it was sometime in the 1860's. Gunder K. Dailey erected a blacksmith and wagon shop there. In 1880 a tornado leveled that building. The twenty-four by forty-two foot replacement added a wood shop and grindstone room to polish steel plows. This equipment was run by horsepower. Ernie Kuns purchased the building and moved his business to the site in 1948. I worked many hours in that building before leaving for college after High School. My parent's home is gone and now so is the business building. Not much left there for me other than memories and the tree he planted in 1964. Neil Kuns
