The Mitten Knitter

I had forgotten how cold winters are in Iowa until one January several years ago when I flew back from California to deliver an address at Minnesota Bible College. The temperature was 70 degrees and the Palm trees were swaying with the balmy breezes when I arrived at Los Angeles International Airport in the middle of the night for my "Red Eye" flight to the Midwest. Not taking into consideration a wind-chill factor, the temperature was 28 below zero when my brother Alan picked me up at Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport. My polyester pants held out the chill about as well as a screen door holds out a blizzard. Aching ears, numb thighs and burning lungs soon renewed my appreciation for the incomparable *joys* of winter weather.

As children we welcomed snow suits, knitted caps, rubber buckle-up overshoes, and woolen mittens which kept the cold weather from freezing our fuzz. Two time transitions assured us that we were becoming "young people" and were no longer "children." One was the first winter season our parents allowed us to go without snow pants, and the other was when we graduated from mittens to gloves. Only *kids* wore mittens.

"Grandma Back" was the mitten knitter of Fertile. This spry and sprightly old lady lived near us on the east side. She wore a long black dress, walked everywhere she went in town, summer or winter, and carried herself with the forward thrust that reminded me of the sunbonneted woman on the "Old Dutch Cleanser" scouring powder can. About the time the leaves were falling in October Mother would take us to Grandma Back's house so she could draw around our hands and get an idea as to how large to knit the mittens. Although I don't remember it there was surely a discussion as to color at that time.

The mitten knitter then busied herself with needles and yarn, and notified mother when the little hand warmers were ready. Detached mittens often became misplaced. Well, *one* of them would get lost. To forestall this, mothers would connect the mittens to each other by a crocheted cord, which was threaded through both sleeves of the overcoat. We managed this by first putting on the mittens, with the cord running up and over our shoulders, and *then* donning the overcoat. This meant that the child must take *off* the mittens before taking off the coat, or the process would have to be repeated. A whimsical sight was to see all the overcoats hung in the school cloak room with mittens a dangle.

Both mittens and coats got wet when we played in the white stuff making snow angels, snow balls, show forts or snow men. After shaking and brushing off the snow and water, we would hang the whole ensemble near enough to the heating stove to dry, but not so near as to become too hot and thus to shrink. By the next morning everything was dry and ready for fun and games and to keep a youngster warm.

I never knew the economics of the transaction, but Mom reminded me that Grandma Back would be obligated to no person. When anyone gave her cookies, a cake or a loaf of bread, she would nearly beat the giver back home with some gift in return. We surely paid her for the yarn and the knitting, but she was of an earlier, hardier, more independent stock which would be appalled by the "world owes me a living" attitude all too prevalent today. Where did all they of that generation come from, and where did they all go?

Belle of the ball: Fertile woman, 104, honored as oldest alumna at high school reunion

FERTILE | Viola Roberts, 104, was the belle of the ball at the Fertile All-School Reunion. Roberts, who graduated a whopping 85 years ago, was the oldest alum in attendance at the event earlier this summer.

She received her own tiara. My it's pretty, isn't it?" she said after putting it on for a photo.

Roberts, who is in the same house in Fertile where she has lived for the past 50 years, is almost always at the reunion.

The event, which is open to everyone who ever attended school in Fertile, takes place every three years. She had to miss the one in 2015 because she was sick, but she was there this year in her usual spot right by the door so she could watch everyone enter.

"It was so interesting to sit there and see all the people," she said. "A lot of them come over and talk to me."

Roberts was born 2 miles west of Fertile. When she was 7, her family moved to northern Wisconsin. Winters there were harsh. Snow would cover their entire fence. "I remember how we would get so excited when we could see the top of the fence posts peeking out of the snow," she said. One good thing about all the snow was "we had a good hill to slide on," Roberts said.

The family moved back to Fertile when she was 14, so she spent all her high school years there, graduating in 1933. Roberts was on the girls basketball team, although she joked it was mostly "in name only." Still, she got her own uniform, which each player had to order on their own. When the uniform arrived, "my mother about had a fit," Roberts said. The uniform was knee-length, sleeveless, and had a V-neck. Roberts saw nothing improper about it, but her mother, who came from an era where women wore floor-length skirts, was appalled. To her, "It was like I was half-naked," Roberts said. Roberts and her teammates only competed with each other, unlike the boys basketball team which got to play against other area schools such as Hanlontown.

She also remembers taking home economics during her sophomore year. "I had to tell the teacher how to make gravy," Roberts said. She said she and her siblings "grew up on potatoes and gravy.

Roberts' graduating class only had about 18 students. "I think I'm the only one left," she said. When you go to a school as small as Fertile, you not only know the students in your own class, but all the others at the high school and some of those in the lower grades as well, according to Roberts.

About six months after she graduated, Viola married Forrest Roberts, a 1927 Fertile High School graduate. "We always called him 'Frosty,'" she said.

After they were married the couple moved to a farm about 75 miles north of the Twin Cities. Three years later they moved back to the Fertile area and bought a farm southeast of town. They farmed the land for 30 years Toward the end of that time, Frosty began driving a semi. "I did all the farm work by myself for two years," Viola said. "I figured that was enough."

The couple moved to a house in town in 1967. Frosty died in 2003.

Although she now needs a walker to get around on foot, Viola still drives her 2000 Buick."It runs like a top," she said. Viola doesn't just drive around town. "I drive wherever I want to go," she said – including Mason City. However, she doesn't drive in bigger cities like Ames or Des Moines because she doesn't like it. Viola has three children, 11 grandchildren, 15 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. Her youngest child, Joanne Zrostlick, who now lives in Shell Rock, graduated from Fertile High School in 1962. It was the last class to graduate from Fertile. After that the school closed and the town and the surrounding area became part of the Forest City School District.

For Roberts, age is truly only a number. "I don't even think about it," she said. "If I want to do it, I just do it."
