# Henry and Iva (Kirk) Suby family

The year was 1938 Henry and Iva had six children and Iva was pregnant with the seventh child, Allen, and had no place to go. The farm that Henry rented was no longer available, and Henry was not able to obtain another farm to rent. Iva's dad (Grandpa Jim Kirk) owned a wooded area north of Fertile and agreed to build Henry and Iva a house on the land. Apparently Iva's mother (Grandma Emma Kirk) paid for the material to build the house. By May, 1939 the two story house was built which was 16ft. by 24 ft., and Allen Suby was born.

Grandpa and Grandma Kirk had provided a place for Henry and Iva to live without the fear of losing a place to stay. They remained in the home rent free until the early 1960's when Jim Kirk passed away and the property was inherited by Iva. The remodeled home is currently owned by Bob and Brenda Jones. Brenda is the granddaughter of Henry and Iva.

In the early 1940's Henry began working in the newly established Limestone Products Company. The company was owned by Leo Elthan and Norman Jorgenson. Henry was a good employee and had great mechanical ability. Both Leo and Norman decided to make Henry a foreman and partner. They sold Henry 10% of the company with no money down and no interest. Because of the generosity of Leo and Norman, Henry, was given an annual salary of \$52.50 per week. The company allowed all of Henry's sons to work at the quarry and included Robert, Roger, Leon, Boyd and Allen. Henry did not pay for his share in the company until the late

50's when he received an annual dividend that was enough to pay off his share that was established in the early 40's.

Norman Jorgenson liked Henry because he was reliable and he never used bad language. Had it not been for the generosity of Leo Elthon and Norman Jorgenson who provided income for the family and the generosity of Grandpa and Grandpa Kirk, it is questionable if the family would have be able to stay together.

Iva (Kirk) Suby's life was not easy. In the 40's she had to raise eight kids with no well, no refrigerator, and no inside plumbing. The water we hauled from the neighbors who were Doris and Rollie Oswald. In the summer Iva, Roger and Leon also worked in the vegetable fields also known and the "peat slough" weeding onions for extra money.

The family has been fortunate because there have been no early deaths in the Suby family. Helen (Dolly) lived to age 90. Robert lived to age 74. Roger, Leon and Boyd all lived to the middle and late 80's. Henry lived to age 77 and suffered with rheumatoid arthritis. Iva lived to age 83 and was active to the end of her life.

This cake is everything you've ever wanted in a dessert because it basically contains all of those tasty, sugary morsels of goodness that you crave!

1 package Duncan Hines devils food cake mix

- 1 1/3 cup water
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 3 eggs

8 ounces Smucker's prepared butterscotch ice cream topping

1 (14-ounce) can sweetened condensed milk

8 ounces Butterfinger candy bars (any size as long as it equals 8 ounces)

1 (8-ounce) container frozen whipped topping, thawed

8 ounces cream cheese, softened

Preheat oven to **350 degrees F.** Spray a **9 x 13-inch Mix** cake mix and water on low, add oil, and eggs. **Mix** on medium for 2 minutes until all dry ingredients are well combined.

**Put** in pan and bake for 35 to 40 minutes. Remove cake to a cooling rack and immediately poke holes from top to bottom using a wooden spoon handle or chopstick.

**Combine** the butterscotch topping with the condensed milk in a bowl and pour over the cake slowly so that it seeps into the holes and permeates the cake.

**Crush** the candy into bits and sprinkle the top of the cake with half of the bits.

With an electric mixer on low, mix whipped topping with cream cheese until smooth. Spread on top of the cake and garnish with the remaining crushed candy bits. Cover top lightly with a sheet of waxed paper and chill for 1 hour or overnight before serving.

# Energetic 82-year-old seeks bus for her school in earthquake-ravaged Nicaragua

At 82, Mabel Elthon of Fertile has embarked upon fund-raising project which would give a younger, less energetic person ulcers.

Mabel, who has spent a total of 53 years working as a missionary in Central America, seeks to raise thousands of dollars in order to purchase a school bus for the elementary school which honors her name and is located in earthquake-ravaged Nicaragua.

During a recent Summit interview at the home she maintains in Fertile, this dedicated missionary worker explained the circumstances surrounding her most recent project.

Miss Elthon was asked to serve as a consultant for the First Central American Evangelical church of Managua, the capital city of Nicaragua, after it was devastated by the 1973 earthquake. The church is the largest and oldest of ten churches in this city which are affiliated with the Central American Mission, an interdenominational organization to which

Mabel has dedicated her life.

Virtually all of the city's schools and churches were damaged, if not totally destroyed in the quake which claimed an estimated 20,000 lives in this city of 450,000 persons.

Mabel said the First Evangelical church was rebuilt from scratch with the aid of a \$15,000 gift from a congregation in Grand Rapids, Mich., which paid for 75 per cent of the construction costs.

BUT LATER, the Nicaragua church congregation decided to also build a school, since so many within the city were destroyed. One weekend when Mabel was out-of-town,

the congregation approved the school project and named it "Centro Escolar Mabel I. Elthon" after their consultant. Mabel protested, but her efforts to encourage the people to name the school for a former pastor failed.

The school was constructed two years ago on the church lot and was fashioned from cement block and wood. It contains eight rooms, each designed for 40 students. Enrollment this year is 250 students, Mabel reports, with 11 staff members in charge of operations. She refused the directorship of the school, choosing instead to remain as counselor.

"Tm supposed to be retired," she laughs. Nearly three-quarters of the student'population walks the distance to school. The remaining one-fourth are transported in two "rattletrap" station wagons, according to Mabel.

"To go on another year with such transportation. . . well, we might as well just say "no transportation," she said.

Parents have complained to school officials when their children arrived home late or are picked up late for school, she went on. Many of the capital's streets are still not repaired from the quake and the old station wagons often break down.

## AT AGE 80, I'M A SURVIVOR

In the 1930's I lost a 3 ½ year old boy with cancer, two years later I laid a 9 month old baby to rest from flu. The depression was here. The first funeral cost \$25.00, the second one \$45.00.

We were on the farm and corn was 10 cents a bushel and we sold a 400 lb sow for \$4.00. But we survived!

In the 50's I became divorced and left with 4 children. No use in crying, it was up to me.

Three years later, our whole farm and all our neighbors were struck by a tornado. No one was killed. All our buildings except for the house were gone and very little insurance. Again, I survived.

It wasn't easy and it took years but I went back to work while taking college courses to renew my teaching certificate and every cent I made paid bills. I did not ask for help.

I don't think I ever felt sorry for myself.

God loves me and watches over me and my family every day, I trust Him and I'll survive.
