## **REMEMBERING MARIAN MIDTGAARD**



For those of you that didn't know Marian Midtgaard, I will tell you this. You missed out big time.

Marian Midtgaard was an institution in the Mason City school system, admired by former students and their parents and her fellow co-workers. Harding Elementary school was a second home to Marian for a huge chunk of her life. She was a kindergarten teacher who left each child with a smile and a hug. But more than that, she left them with a zest for school and learning that many of them still had when they graduated from college.

I can no longer picture the old brick schoolhouse with the kindergarten teacher. The memories of Marian, the school, and the times have melded together now as one. It seems like a long time ago and it was a long time ago. Not everything has changed but neither is anything the same. The old elementary school has been replaced with a shiny new building that I'm not familiar with. I remember a stately old school that all of our

children attended from kindergarten through sixth grade. And I remember a teacher who launched each student into a world of education with great joy. Now they are both gone but the memory will live on forever.

Marian was just a little bit of a thing. I don't know if she was even 5 feet tall. She was short enough that eye-to-eye contact with her young students wasn't a problem. Actually, I don't think much of anything was a problem for Marian. She had an attitude and an outlook that was second to none. She was bubbly and bright and remembered absolutely everything she ever knew about a student and family.

My memories of the time our children were privileged to have Marian for a teacher are in bits and pieces. I remember a teacher who much younger then, not yet 30....a smile that was always there and bright laughing eyes filled with the joy of ding what she loved the most.

I remember a schoolroom at the end of the building filled with drawings made by little boy and girls hands. And little tables and little chairs that Marian fit into beautifully. It was like it was all made to spec for her. And maybe that is how God does things.

I remember a woman who walked her class to the school bus despite the heat, rain, or the snow. She was always holding more than one hand for they all wanted to hold her hand. School was half days then and it wasn't surprising that our children whined about having to "come home at noon" for they loved her and she taught them to love learning.

Marian never forgot a child's name and she never forgot the last conversation she had with a parent about where the adult child was now and how they were doing. She never failed to send her best wishes.

The last time I saw Marian was in a coffee shop where we ran into each other. Marian looked the same to me as she had always looked for I never saw her aging. To me she was always the bubbly happy young teacher I had known and admired for more than 40 years.

She asked that day about everyone or our children as she always did. She professed to being well and happy and enjoying retirement. I think she was lying, I think she would rather have been in that room at the end of the hallway filled with memories of so many adoring students and the time on earth she loved so much.

Marian Midtgaard deserved to live far longer than she did. The impact of her attitude and her personality could change a person's outlook, their mood, and their day in a five minute conversation on a street corner.

She is a woman who deserved to live to be 100, free of pain and disabilities. She deserved to hear the tributes and the praise that are reserved for the dead and that are seldom spoken in life. She deserved every wonderful thing that ever happened to her and everyone who loved her and admired her. Her influence on our children was tremendous and her impact on us will remain forever. There will never be another Marian Midtgaard.

Marian's words in the Fertile School book: "Being an advocate for young children is a quality which has helped me develop into the person I am today. Teaching kindergarten children for 39 years was my dream since my senior year in high school. I feel very fortunate to have been involved in a profession which offered so much satisfaction and joy in my life".

**From the editor:** Marian died suddenly at the age of 70 in 2008. She was the daughter of Melvin and Martha Midtgaard and grew up on a farm west of Fertile. She attended all her school years at Fertile and graduated in 1956. She taught school in Lake Mills and Minneapolis, MN before going to Harding in Mason City, where she taught for 39 years.

Marian was a classmate and a good friend. As the article said, she was always smiling and her laughter was contagious. I recall a short and well-remembered encounter with Marian shortly after I moved to Fertile in 1947 (I came from a small country school). I asked her why she was so much smaller than the rest of our class ......well, she was small, but mighty as she cleaned my clock!!! I never asked her anything like that again and we were good friends after the wounds healed!!

## THOUGHTS OF FARMER RON

Welcome to the peat farmer's letter.

I should explain what the acre of different vegetables that I am raising for North Iowa Fresh means. It is a

food hub and it is just what it sounds like. By Thursday of a week, I call in what I will have available the following week. Andrea gets this information from all of the different producers. She then sends this list to the various buvers on Friday. They, in turn, look at the list and decide what local foods they want the next week and what quantity and submit this list by early Monday morning. She then makes up the list for each grower and e-mails it by 11:00 a.m. Monday. Each grower then gets his list ready to deliver to Opportunity Village in Clear Lake by 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday so they can go out to their various buyers. An example is that Hy-Vee may order onions and potatoes from me, tomatoes and peppers from a second grower and leafy greens from a third, however, there is just one delivery. This avoids several producers coming to Hy-Vee. The price is set before the season starts so both the grower and the buyer knows what they will get paid or what they will get charged. North Iowa Fresh charges a percentage for their part and each grower pays a \$100.00 fee at the beginning of the season. Payment is made about thirty days after delivery. Some products like onions and potatoes can be harvested ahead because they will keep if I harvest more than is sold that week. Products like carrots and turnips are harvested as needed each week. It is working out to be better than wholesale, but not as good as a Farmer's Market. The fact that I can do things on my schedule and I only harvest what is sold makes up for it and is what I like during the summer months. I can offer more and then cut back when we get into onion harvest. They also have the right to reject produce if it does not meet the buyer's specs. In that case, the grower, if possible, needs to improve the product or not get paid. Will I do this again next year? Yes, with my busy schedule, it works better than Farmer's Markets. Next month I will tell you my impression of the new café. Until next time, thank a farmer for the food on your plate, thank a vet for the freedoms we enjoy, and above all, thank God for your daily blessings.

Flowers that are locally grown are more much more unique (many flowers I grow are too fragile or can't be shipped in from another country and aren't available at your local florist), they smell better because they are fresher and chemical free (safe to sniff), and they help our local ecosystem (more bee's and butterflies please)! I am proud to offer these local and sustainably grown flowers at markets, for your special occasion, or "just because flowers". I grow all my flowers from seed, root or bulb, and then I hand cut the blooms right before arranging whatever creation I am working on. My flowers change every week as they are seasonal and might only bloom for certain times of the year, however I have so many flowers growing you will be certain to find an amazing variety blooming you will love. #### PUMPKIN CREAM CHEESE SWIRL MUFFINS YIELD: 18 MUFFINS

1 3/4 cups all purpose flour
1 tablespoon pumpkin spice
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 (15 oz) can pumpkin (pure pumpkin puree)
1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
2 large eggs
1/2 cup vegetable oil
1 tablespoon vanilla extract

8 oz cream cheese1/4 cup granulated sugar1 large egg yolk2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 375°F. Place paper baking cups into muffin pan. Set aside.

In a medium bowl, whisk flour, pumpkin spice, baking soda and salt until well combined. Set aside. In large bowl, whisk together pumpkin, sugar and brown sugar.

Beat in eggs, vegetable oil and vanilla extract. Slowly whisk in the flour mixture, until there are no lumps. Fill muffin tins 3/4 full.

In a medium bowl, beat cream cheese until smooth. Add in sugar, egg yolk and vanilla extract and beat until well combined.

Top each muffin with about 1 tablespoon of cream cheese mixture and use a toothpick to swirl it into the batter. This will not look smooth, but it will bake up much prettier.

Bake muffins for 18-20 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

These are best at room temperature or even slightly chilled! Store in an airtight container in the fridge.
