6-16-75 Philosophical grocer ends career in Fertile

While the auctioneers yelled and waved their arms outside before a small crowd of bidders, Thelan Elthon scurried in and about the store, running errands and stopping every few paces to acknowledge a familiar face or chat with a friend.

The occasion was Saturday's auctioning of the last remaining goods of Elthon's Grocery in Fertile, owned and operated by Thelan and his wife for the past 34 years and established by his father, A. A. Elthon, in 1894.

For Elthon, the auction marked the end of a hectic but prosperous business career in this clean little town which hugs the banks of the Winnebago River.

But for residents of Fertile, it meant that for the first time in 81 years, the town would have no grocery—at least temporarily. Elthon, who is now trying to sell the store

and its fixtures, is "fairly confident" that it will be operated again as a grocery. "I would have turned it over if there were

anybody in town who wanted to run it," he says. He adds that at present, there are two prospective buyers for the store.

Left to his own devices, Elthon would probably still base his life around the small grocery, spending most of his waking hours either behind the meat case or the checkout counter. However, a March 2 stroke "really floored" him and sent Thelan into "early retirement" at age 65. Elthon belongs to a breed of small-town

philosophers that is vanishing much too rapidly from the Summitland scene, Winding wit and proverb into practical life, he leaves people thinking about his stories and personal anecdotes long after they've left the store. The grocer from Fertile, however, is unlike

most other small-town philosophers in that he has actually lived most of his stories through an amazingly active public and community life. Mayor, school board president, scoutmaster, Lions Club president, Bible school teacher, Worth county conservation board chairman, acting town marshall-you name it and Elthon's been it.

'Just like any other small businessman," he said, "there isn't enough of you so you just take turns.'

Fertile residents responded to his community efforts by patronizing the home-town grocery.

"People have always supported us and we've always extended credit," said Elthon. "When people have experienced hardships, or when the breadwinner has been taken, many

times we've given the account to the family." Although Elthon claims to have been broken

into "about every other year on the average," he's never had a fire loss. And he's proud of the fact that the store has never failed an Iowa Department of Agriculture inspection. "I've got the file to prove it," he says—and

Family institution changing hands

FERTILE - A family institution dating back to 1894 soon will change hands on Fertile's tiny main street. Elthon's grocery store is up for sale.

Thelan Elthon, the owner, says he "was almost born behind the counter" of the tiny store. He first started working in it for his father. Andrew A. Elthon. at the age of 12 in 1921.

Elthon managed the store from 1929 until 1941, when he purchased it from his father, and he and his wife Lillian have operated it since then, with six-day work weeks being a way of life.

Elthon decided to sell the business "after a stroke slowed me down last year." "We decided it was time to travel and do some fishing, which we've gotten way behind on:

"We've made a nice living here. . .educated our kids and all," said Elthon. "People have always treated us fine. In some cases we're serving the fifth generation of a family."

"We'll miss the people very much," said his wife Lillian. She added that the work schedule of the store didn't hamper her lifestyle too much. "I always managed to do laundry on Monday and clean house on Friday."

"It wasn't self-serve in the old days," said Mrs. Elthon. "Customers would call in their orders or write them up and we'd get them together for pickup. We had charge accounts before they were even a popular thing among businessmen."

"I'm sure our selling out will mean the end of grocery charge accounts in Fertile." added her husband. "Everything is cash and carry in the procery business now.

"We've survived shortages, rationing, stamps, OPA, NRA, and every other alphabet the government could think up over the years," said Elthon. "Not too many stores in the area have stayed in one family this long.

The store's interior has changed little through the years except for occasional paint jobs and addition of refrigeration equipment. An ancient scale first used by his father now is a wall decoration. The scales still in use at the checkout counter date back to 1940, and a chalk board used to mark up meat prices has been in use since before 1920.

"I had the line 'Pioneer Store' added to our billing slips because I thought it fit. ...this was the first grocery here," said Elthon. "My father didn't think too much of it at the time though.

"We also did a good business selling fishing tackle. It didn't net that much, and break-ins made us stop that."

With some trips out west in the Elthons' future plans "maybe we can practice using some good tackle again instead of selling it."

he does. But now, Elthon plans to slow down a bit, along with his wife, Lillian, who has helped on and off at the store, "health and family per "itting." They will no doubt spend more hours with

their children. Mrs. Ken Midtgaard, a Mason Citynurse; Robert, a used car sales manager in Mason City; and Betty, a nurse at a Minneapolis hospital. Oh, he'll fish a little, Thelan says, adding

quickly that "I have had some time to do a little fishing over the years."

Buena's Tarde's – Good Afternoon. It has come to my attention that some of you are

upset, even offended by my use of a greeting in Spanish. Let me explain.

First. As part of his farming operation, my father grew onions. To do the weeding and hand topping, he hired migrant Mexicans from Texas. I grew up working side by side with them. One, Juan, from Crystal City, Texas, taught me the Mexican way to sew an onion bag. They were good people and I really am glad I had that opportunity.

Second. Speaking a few words of Spanish, even if it is broken, is a good welcome. "Halo-Coma Estas-Me Llamo Ron" which means "Hello-How are you-My name is Ron" goes a long was in greeting a Spanish speaking person. I remember when Jane and Al had the café; I would come in in midmorning and see Al and Alex. Both came from South Texas and had been here their entire adult life speaking English. However, when they talked to each other, it was Spanish because it was their native tongue. I don't know any better than anyone else who will work at the new pork plant in Mason City, but if other plants are any indication, it could be Spanish speaking people and some could be coming to Fertile to live.

Please don't misunderstand me. I am not advocating a change in our national language from English to Spanish, quite the opposite. Everyone in this country has to have a working knowledge of English to function. However, this idea that this is America and we only speak English is silly and will never happen. People will speak their native tongue and it is up to us to honor it. We are a better nation, a better community, when we celebrate and honor diversity. This is what made the U.S.A the greatest nation on earth.
