#### MY RECALL OF MR. WILDS

Mr. Wild's ran the café at one time and I think he owned it. There was a building west of the café and it was the Eikenberry summer room.

Mr. Wilds said that when a certain man came to town he was going to whip him. When the man came to town they had a rumpus and Wild's upper plate was broken in the fight. Wilds was a bootlegger and Amen from Fertile were on water of the booze cache. One man said of a noise he had heard, "Is that you?" and then they arrested Wilds.

In court he had a gun on him and a list of people he was going to get.

After prison he intended to rob a man up around Buffalo Center and the man said "I'm not afraid of you Wilds" and took his mask

off...then more jail time.

Mr. Wilds set the building on fire by kerosene on the stairway. The people had a rope they used to get out of the burning building. The pump west of the Post Office was put out of commission before he set the fire and the water was carried from the river in pails. The source of kerosene was also traced. I remember watching the fire from my Grandma's window. The heat broke the windows in the front of the butcher shop which is now Ray Sandifer's building.



#### A gift of life: Forest City eighthgrader receives kidney from lifelong family friend

FERTILE — Standing 37 inches tall and weighing 40 pounds, 14-year-old Madison Kirschbaum has always had a natural affinity for steak.

After receiving a kidney in November from lifelong family friend Ann Brcka the eighth-grader at Forest City might start to order more chicken.

"After the surgery, we all joked that Madison would start eating chicken over steak because I like chicken," Brcka, 46, said. "It didn't happen."
The example is just a small glimpse into the bond Brcka and Kirschbaum will forever share.
Kirschbaum, the daughter of Eric and Brenda Kirschbaum, went into kidney failure in 2002 and two years ago doctors said she needed a kidney

transplant.

After a year of searching for the right match, Brcka discovered she qualified as a donor.

"It was an easy decision (to donate the kidney)," Brcka said.

Brcka had blood work completed, a kidney scan, talked to social workers and psychologists, had appointments with nutritionists and medical tests to ensure the transplant would work.

"Sometimes I think it would be easier if you didn't know the person donating," said Madison's mother, Brenda Kirschbaum.

The Brckas and Kirschbaums both live in Fertile and have been life-long friends. Ann has known Madison since she was born.

On Nov. 7 their connection grew even deeper

when, during a four-hour surgery, Kirschbaum received Brcka's kidney.

The road back to health has been filled with ups and downs. Kirschbaum stayed in Minneapolis so she could be close to the hospital until Christmas Eve when doctors told her she could go home. "It was a good Christmas present." she said. She was home until New Year's Eve when she was hospitalized again because of illness. After figuring out what was slowing Kirschbaum.

After figuring out what was slowing Kirschbaum, doctors sent her home on Jan.9 and she has been there ever since.

In the months following, Kirschbaum has slowly worked her way back to attending school. On April 3, she climbed on the bus and started going half days.

"The best part has been seeing all of my friends," Kirschbaum said. "I had to spend a whole class period talking with friends to see what has happened this school year."

Kirschbaum is able to go to school because overall after the surgery, she has been feeling much better. She has gained eight pounds and has grown an inch and a half. She has more energy and is returning to her spunky self.

"I used to feel icky all the time like I was sick," Kirschbaum said. "Now I feel healthy." In her free time, Kirschbaum enjoys swimming, watching TV and being a normal teenager. But her upbeat attitude is what shines the brightest when you see her.

"Madison can make anyone smile," Brenda
Kirschbaum said. "She is just naturally positive."
Kirschbaum is practicing her famous smile for a trip
to Orlando next year. The Brckas and the
Kirschbaums plan on celebrating the one-year
anniversary of the transplant with some fun in the
sun.

Beyond that, Kirschbaum looks forward to the idea of driving, graduating and enjoying her high school vears.

"The community has been fantastic," Brenda Kirschbaum said. "The number of phone calls, texts, frozen meals and words of encouragement have been overwhelming."




