LOW INCOME NORTH IOWANS CAN COLLECT CHEESE

The Iowa Department of Social Service announces the first distribution of Surplus Government Cheese March 16 and 18, between 10 AM and 4 PM. The site for Fertile is the Community Center.

The eligibility guidelines and amount of charge which can be received are as follows: Five pounds of cheese - one person with a monthly income of \$664; two persons with a combined monthly income of \$878; three persons with a combined monthly income of \$1,090; four persons with a combined monthly income of \$1,303; and five persons with a combined monthly income of \$1,516.

Ten pounds of cheese - six persons with a combined monthly income of \$1,728; seven persons with a combined monthly income of \$1,941, and eight persons with a combined monthly income of \$2,153.

Fertile will receive 240 pounds of cheese. There will be forms available at the Center to be completed by each person requesting cheese. The monthly income must be listed on these forms. The Senior Citizens are in charge of this program. More details are published in The Northwood Anchor.
