This is a follow up on the story of the Winnebago Indians and their living in Hungry Hollow.

Yes, the Indians did go west past a big rock known as Camp Rock, North of the buildings where Dale Hyde and his family live now.

Several years ago my two Uncles Gurt Orcutt and Albert Orcutt had cabins built and lived South of the Winnebago River. The land then was owned by their brother Will Orcutt. Later it was bought by E.B. Stillman of Clear Lake.

In 1981 a piece of this land was bought by Danny Calgaard from the Stillman Estate. He cleared this land and when he began to till it to plant his crops, he found a number of arrows. He found one piece he didn't know what it was, so he took it to Mrs. Leo Oswald and she being well versed in Indian Relics knew it was an Indian Needle. They used it to sew their animal skin, clothing and moccasins. So this is evidence of many battles fought by the Winnebago Indians and other tribes in that territory.

Danny has all the arrows, needle and other relics he has found there. This land is privately owned and no trespassers are allowed on it due to ruining the crops planted there.

Martin Ouverson was the first White Child born here among the Indians. His Mother was afraid of them. They came to see the baby. Mrs. Ouverson was afraid they would sneak in and steal him. But they finally got her to understand they just come to see him and would do him no harm.

Martins parents names was Halvor and Ingebor Ouverson. And Martin was married to Christine Erickson. They had five Children, Harold, Leonard, Donald, Irene and Edna, and they lived about one mile South of Fertile.

The Indian learned many things from the white man but the white man also learned from the Indian, such as putting a small fish under each hill of corn for a better crop. The white man learned how to make clothing from animal skins and to make moccasins, they also learned how to use a bow and arrow, while the Indian learned that the white man couldn't live on wild game and fish. There were no roads la;id out as we have them now. So the white man took a sled and went across country to Mason City and brought the things he had to have, such as flour, sugar and coffee.

Soon the mill here was built and grain was ground into flour. But the Indians had departed long before the vicinity where they lived was taken over by the white man.

FERTILE GARDEN CLUB

Met at 9:30 a.m. at Fertile Community Center July 1. They toured members' Gardens. At noon they had a sack lunch. Marcella Mitchell and Ruth Wolf served dessert.

They held their business meeting at noon also. Then they continued on their tour of the Gardens.

Roll Call was, each member bring a flower from their Garden.

Synneva Hoffman will give a talk on Flower Arrangements and Ruth Rovang on How to Dry Flowers for Winter Arrangements. We are wondering how many people can remember that at one time Fertile had a weekly newspaper. We have a copy of the Fertile Enterprise found in the belongings of Aimee Nye. It was hand addressed to her father C.A. McEnelly, R.R. The date of this publication is Saturday, July 25, 1903. The paper was published every Saturday with B.J. Booth as publisher and editor. twas entered at the Post Office at Fertile, Iowa for transmission through the mails as second ass matter. The cost was \$1.00 per year in advance.

B.J. Booth was born in Iowa County, Wisconsin at Pumpkin Ridge in 1855. When thirteen years of age, he came with his parents to Northern Iowa. He was prominently identified with the educational interests of Worth County and for two terms served the position of County Superintendent of Schools.

In the fall of '99, Fertile business men decided the advisability of a Fertile newspaper and as a result the Fertile Enterprise came into existance with J.F. Rhodes business Manager, E.M. Lang and Dr. Phillips associate editors and B.J. Booth editor. Arrangements were made with J.C. Davenport of Clear Lake to do the press work and under this management the paper was run one year at the close of which B.J. Booth became both editor and manager. Two things from the following article - From the first, the sheet met with the support and sympathy of those who were interested in our pretty village both at home and abroad. The paper has never missed an issue and hundreds of copies have been mailed at the Fertile Post Office each Saturday. At first, many of these copies were marked "Sample" but at present the paper goes to seventeen states, two territories and the District of Columbia telling its readers of the business prosperity, beauty and growth of Fertile, which we as a people are proud to call home. It tells of our churches, our schools and all that goes to build up our community. The Enterprise is sent out with malice toward none and good will for all. This paper, as all others, has an influence and that power is without exception is used for what we believe to be for the public good. We ask for your Cooperation and support for the future as we have realized them in the past and trust that the help received and given shall be mutual in building our town up in all things which tend toward the advancement of our business interests. The above quote was written by Mrs. Booth.

We also have another Copy of a double fold newspaper. One sheet is labeled The Hanlontown News and the other sheet is The Fertile News. This paper was postmarked Friday, April 9, 1920 d had been sent to John Fankell. This paper cost \$1.50 per year. This news sheet was pub-

______shed by M.A. Aasgard as owner and publisher. It was entered at the post office as second class matter in Hanlontown under the act of Congress of March 8, 1879. H.K. Lockrem was the local editor.

The two papers had their fair share of advertisements as the papers of today have. They, too, must have had new's reporters who filled in the local people of the happenings and goings on of the local people. They even had advertisements from Clear Lake and Mason City to help with their expenses. The patent medicines were well advertised and from their reports "they could cure many ailments" -all the way from a cold to a severe case of piles! From time to time in the Fertile Newsletter we hope to reproduce some of the old advertisements and the local news of that day as it was read by the readers of that day. Perhaps to many of the Old Timers it will bring a smile of remembrance - to those who are younger, perhaps "I can hardly believe it".

In its early days, Fertile was a little, thriving metropolis. Fertile boasted a Blacksmith Shop, a Furniture Store, a Funeral Parlor, a Drug Store, a Barber Shop, Grocery Stores, Dry Goods Store -- perhaps many others as well. Mrs. Caroline Rye operated a Cafe in the old Post Office Building. The fire department consisted of well bodied men plus pails!

In the early forties, Fertile had three grocery stores, three garages with filling stations, free movies once a week, two restaurants -- These come to mind as I am writing this. We hope you have enjoyed this trip down memory lane.
