The Fertile City Council met Feb.4 with Mayor Hoffman presiding. Council members present were Petersen, Sandifer & Hare. Also present were Red & Kay Olson, Leonard Bailey, Le: Burtness, Evelyn Knudsen, Rosemary Tannahill, Dick Sheimo & Charlie Nye. Minutes of the previous meeting

were read & approved.

Report on repair of sewage lagoon pumps.

Report on paint problem at water tower.

Report on progress of annexation. Nearly all of the property owners near Hwy.9 have signed a petition for voluntary annexation.

Council received resignation of Debbie Morse from the Library Board effective Mar.10. Librarian will seek a replacement.

Council discussed the new speed limit signs to be installed in the spring.

Revenue sharing requests were received from: Crisis Center, Neighborhood Food Bank, Senior Citizens, Chemical Dependency Center, Fertile Library Board, Fertile Little League and Girls Softball.

Fire department and library budgets were discussed. Council worked on budget for fiscal year 1986-87. Special meeting to be held Feb.ll to finish the preliminary budget preparation.

Proposal to have a class at the Library on the use of the computer.

Motion to increase the gas allowance for Dick Sheimo to \$20 per month. Carried.

Motion to pay monthly bills. Carried. Meeting adjourned.

The Fertile City Council met in special session Feb.11 with Mayor Hoffman presiding. Council members present were Hare, Sandifer, Petersen & Kirschbaum. Also present were Charlie Nye & Dick Worsley.

Council continued to work on the budget.

Council discussed the paint on the water tower. Copy of the report from the engineer will be available by the March meeting.

Discussion on set back thermost for some of the city buildings. Meeting adjourned.

-While my parents lived on the farm in the big white house on the hill, the first No. 9 road was built. The first No. 9 was what is now our Main Street. From the Church of Christ building down the hill and to Jordon's filling station, then west up Main Street to the corner by Virgil Ouverson's house, north to the corner and west up the hill, and it took a portion of my parents' front yard. I remember standing in the yard watching them work. They used horse drawn scrapers and horse drawn dump wagons. Up and down, up and around and do it all over again.

Bob Kuhns who goes to the Church of Christ here in Fertile, drove one of the dump trucks. I know, for I saw him work there. Now this was done when I was a young girl.

Years later Edwin Ouverson and I were married on April 17, 1927. We worked my dad's farm. My folks lived in the south part of the house and Edwin and I had the kitchen, dining room, back porch and part of the upstairs. The year they decided to straighten No. 9 they cut my dad's farm in half north of the building where No. 9 is now. They used all horses, scrapers and dump wagons again. Their camp was on the north side of the road and I had to drive our cows to the pasture on the north side of their camp. Our pasture included Goose Lake and at that time, Goose Lake was all water and peat bogs. There were also rattlesnakes out there. Now Goose Lake is under cultivation.

I remember one time my dad sent me for the cows and one ornery one was way out in the bogs and water. I had to get a horse and ride it out after that cow. The ground shook at every step. Finally I got on the other side of the cow and started back across to get home. I had to let the horse pick its way to get out, but we made it to solid ground and we got home. Boy was I scared!!

I also drove a team of horses on the old wooden school buses. I believe Phil Sheimo has one of those old buses. They were very heavy in spring and sleighs were used in winter sometimes. I remember leaving the bus at Chris Benson's at the end of the route and unhitch the horses and hook up to a buggy at night and come home in the morning. I drove horses and buggy to the Benson place and unhitched from the buggy and hitched up to the school bus and started picking up the children at Benson's field. I went from Sheimo's to No. 9 going west to the Sam Pederson home and back to where Maynard Midtgaard lives now and into the school house. I backed the bus to the sidewalk, let the kids out the door at the back end of bus and drove home. I unhitched the horses and put them in the barn, ran to the house, washed up, got ready for school and ran to beat the tardy bell. The next year the route went past the Clarence Ouverson farm. The same procedure morning and night. Sanderson, Cari, Zobel, Evans, Fankell were some of the children. I graduated from High School in 1926. Never a dull moment and no time for mischief.

Some of my high school teachers were George Casner, Mrs. Leo Uswald, (Genevieve Randall), Julian Wing, Red Hill, Mrs. Lewis Tallackson, Kalph Adamson, Earl Baker and Winifred Van Ness.

In the 6th grade Clarinda Halvorson (Brenden, now of Fertile) was my teacher. In the 7th grade my teacher was Agatha Chehock and in the 8th grade my teacher was Genevieve Galbreath.

In those days (the 1920's), the 8th grade pupils all had to take the County Examinations before entering High School. I graduated in May of 1926 from the Fertile Consolidated School in I, Helen Humphrey Ouverson', was born January 23, 1908 on my parents' farm four miles southwest of Fertile, lowa, in Cerro Gordo County. The "Home" was on the north bank of Lime Creek River, (now named Winnebago River after the Winnebago Indians that camped by the river near Fertile). My parents were William Henry Humphrey and Edith White Humphrey.

We kids walked two miles to County School. My father owned a large herd of purebred Holstein cows which were milked by hand. The pails of milk were separated. The separator was run by power by the black pony, Bonnie, walking up a treadmill. The cream was hauled to the Fertile Creamery three times a week.

Years later my dad owned a farm west of Fertile, but within the city limits. This farm is now owned by Mrs. Ole Felland. My parents lived there many years and my dad had many Holstein cows which were milked by hand. Each one of us had certain cows to milk twice a day. Later my dad bought one of the first milking machines and this machine was operated by a gasoline engine for years.

I remember when Lewis Foster and son Kent Foster moved to Fertile and operated the Old mill at the dam. They installed a generator in the lower portion of the Mill and used the force of the river water to generate electricity. About 1920 my dad got electricity from there to our barn to run our milking machine. No more hand milking unless the electricity got low. It did once in a while because the houses in Fertile put in electricity so Fertile had electric lights. This sometimes caused the power to become low. It was at those times that we had to milk by hand, but we did have electricity for milking for several years.

It was my job to break the little baby heifer calves to drink milk out of a pail. I had one leg on each side of the calf's neck with a pail of warm water in one hand. I put my finger in the calf's mouth and pushed its mouth and nose into the milk. Sometimes I got my finger bit and if the calf was stubborn, I often got a milk bath. Wow! I was glad when that job was done!!

Clothes were washed by using a large galvanized wash tub and a metal wash board, warm or hot water, and a bar of Fels Naptha Soap or Pond G Soap. You moved your hand up and down the washboard with the clothes. When they were clean you emptied the soapy water out and rinsed the clothes in clean water with bluing in the water for white clothes. The soapy water was used to scrub floors, porches, walks and outhouses. the rest of the water was always poured over Mother's roses and flowers. The soapy water was good to kill the bugs on the flowers. Mother always had beautiful flowers.

I washed on the board all of our clothes for two years or more. Water was carried from the well and put into the boiler to get hot. Lewis Lye was used to cleanse the hard water. A

lime scum would come to the top of the boiler and was dipped off and thrown away. Fels Naptha Soap was used in the then soft hot water. The clean clothes were hung on the line to dry summer and winter. In winter you carried in frozen clothes stiff enough to stand up, and you put them on lines in an unused room to thaw and dry. I've done this many years later. An old second hand washing machine run by a gasoline motor was a back saver. Special lectures at Church of Christ April 4, 5 & 6.
