PECAN PIE BROWNIES Filling: ¼ cup oleo or butter, 2 Tbs. flour, ¾ cup firmly packed brown sugar, 2 eggs, 1 tsp. vanilla, 2 cups chopped pecans.

Brownies: 21¹/₂-oz. pkg. family size deluze fudge brownie mix, ¹/₂ cup very hot tap water, ¹/₄ cup oil, 1 egg.

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease bottom only of 13x9-inch pan. In medium saucepan, melt oleo; stir in flour until smooth. Add brown sugar and 2 eggs; mix well. Cook over medium heat for five minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in vanilla and pecans. Set aside. In large bowl, combine brownie ingredients; beat 50 strokes with spoon. Spread in prepared pan. Spoon filling evenly over top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes or until set. Do not overbake. Cool completely. Cut into bars. Makes 24 bars.
