The Robertelle Center was formerly known as Chemical Dependency Services and was founded in 1980 in response to a drunken driving incident in Forest City. In 1986 the Center was renamed in memory of Sister Mary Robertelle, the original director. The Robertelle Center is an independent no-profit organization and receives no direct funding from any governmental body. it relies on contributions from city and county governments, industry, organizations and individuals. With the elimination of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and the downturn in the local economy, the Center is facing difficulties in paying their expenses. Thus the fund raising efforts. The Center's physical facility was donated by an individual in Forest City. As a result 84% of the Center's annual budget can be devoted to supplying a variety of community and client services. The Robertelle Center serves communities, individuals, and families in Winnebago, Hancočk, Cerro Gordo, Worth and Kossuth Counties. The Center's services are based in education and directed to the chemically dependent and their families, either still suffering from active dependence or those in recovery. The Robertelle Center does not charge for it's information or services, but does accept donations and contributions.

Swiss Vegetable Medley

(Ready To Bake In Just 5 Easy Minutes).

- 1 bag (16 oz.) frozen broccoli, carrots and cauliflower
- combination.
- thawed and drained 1 can (10% oz.) condensed
- cream of mushroom soup
- 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded
- Swiss cheese
- 1/3 cup sour cream 1/4 teaspoon Durkee Ground Black Pepper

MICROWAVE DIRECTIONS: Prepare as above. Cook, covered, on HIGH 8 minutes; turn halfway through. Top with remaining cheese and onions. Cook, uncovered, on HIGH 1 minute or until cheese melts.

. Frozen Cranberry Parfait Pie

Crust:

1/3 cup Butter Flavor Crisco 1 cup graham cracker crumbs 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened cup whipping cream

Filling:

1/4 cup sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1 jar (14 oz.) cranberry-orange sauce

For Crust: Preheat oven to 350°F. Combine cracker crumbs and brown sugar and mix well. Stir in melted Butter Flavor Crisco. Press mixture into ungreased 9-in. pie plate. Bake at 350°F for 10 mins. Cool completely before filling.

For Filling: Beat cream cheese until fluffy. Whip cream until soft peaks form. Beat in sugar and vanilla. Gradually add whipped cream to cream cheese and beat until smooth and cream. Fold in cranberry-orange sauce. Spoon into cooled crust.

Freeze several hours or overnight. To serve, remove from freezer and let stand for 15 mins. at room temperature. Garnish with additional whipped cream if desired. Cut in wedges with sharp knife. Makes one 9-in. pie.
