Remembering Buxton

A slide show, "Remembering Buxton", will be held at the Worth County Historical Society's meeting on Tuesday, May 17, 8:00 p.m. at the Joice Public Library. The public is invited to attend for no charge.

Buxton, a unique part of our lowa heritage, was one of more than one hundred coal towns in Southern Iowa in the early 1900's. It is now gone but many who lived there as children remember it as utopia. Half the townspeople were black and half were white. The two races apparently lived together in an atmosphere of tolerance and harmony.

The film was prepared by Dorothy Schwieder, Associate Professor of History, and Elmer Schwieder, Professor of Family Environment, at Iowa State University.
