

A LONG AGO CHRISTMAS

In the early part of the century, times were very hard. Perhaps no worse that they are today.

Eggs were 5 cents per dozen and dats 10cents per bushel.

Most homes had just enough china to set the table and just enough cooking utensils to get by. A dog or cat was never fed out of a pie tin, as they were all needed for the few kinds of pies made or to hold a few buns for baking.

Each week one trip by all neighbors were made to Clear Lake, about 12 miles, to get whatever was needed. The store wasn't full of canned foods, foods ready to bake, or the variety of meat. It had tea, coffee, cheese, eggs, butter, salt, sugar and kerosene to fill the lamps and once in a while a little to turn on the fuel in the stove to start the fire.

There was a list and added to nit each day as you needed something, so you would not forget it. For you couldn't drive 12 miles to town more than once a week.

There was a small drug store that sold camphor, peppermint, castoria and a few over the counter pills. It always had the candies; horehound, peppermints, and once in awhile wintergreens and some old fashioned hay stack shaped chocolates. Everything coming from there was done up in pink, green or yellow paper. That was all saved during the year.

Just before Christmas a trip was made to Mason City, 25 miles by team and sled. The team was put in the livery stable and the people went to a very clean, cheap restaurant. She served meat, potatoes, one vegetable and either pie or cake and coffee. I don't remember what the charge was and it must have been small or else lots of people would not have gone there.for a meal.

There was a little more to buy in Mason City than at Clear Lake. We always got some cranberries, Christmas candy, peanuts and what ever gifts we needed.

There were no Christmas trees on sale and there wasn't acres of them grown around here as there is today. My grandfather had lots of timber on his farm, which was a quarter of a mile west of ours, and it had lots of jack oaks growing on it. They never loose their leaves in the fall, they lose them later, nearer spring. Dad would go there and cut down a nice pretty one and that was our Christmas tree. It had to be kept in a pail of water, the same as the evergreen does. A few nights before Christmas, we would get out the pink, green and yellow paper that had been saved all year, and cut each into narrow pieces and paste them in rings and make a chain and that was one decoration for our tree. We always grew lots of pop corn and we would pop and string this to put on our tree. And the day before Christmas we could string cranberries too, but the next day after Christmas, we had to take them off the tree and Mother would wash and cock them for New Years dinner.

we had little holders that clipped on the tree that held the candles. Everyone had these, for candles were often used for a light. Sometimes we had to cut out the leaves on the tree so they wouldn't catch fire. We never could light it until everyone was through work at night and ready to be there, as we had to watch close so it didn't catch the tree on fire. We had no expensive star and angel for the top of the tree. So we cut a star from card board, covered it with yellow paper and put it on the top of our tree. Christmas Eve came at last and we all thought it a beautiful tree. It had no electric lights, no tinsel, like today, no high priced ornaments nor any evergreen tree, but we all thought it to be a very pretty tree.

All of the gifts were under the tree and I remember I got a sleeping doll with real hair and a set of dishes and Mother got a beautiful big table lamp. I have all three of these pieces yet today. A couple of days after Christmas the tree had to come down and we set it out in the snow and the birds would eat the pop corn and we hung bread crusts on it and the little birds had a feast too.

I wrote this poem many years ago and Brian Hall gave it at the Christmas Program at our church.

We can shut out the light and the darkness,
