

I will tell you how we kept sweet corn from one years growing to the next. We always had quite a large field of sweet corn, and it never all matured at the same time, but most of it did. We had two wagons with three top boxes on them and two teams of horses. When the corn was ready to pick, we would go into the field and pick both wagon boxes full. We did this late in the afternoon, and bring them up into the shade in the yard.

The next morning we would get up early and do the chores, Mother usually had 250 baby chicks to tend to. We had a small pen that just they could get in, and we would leave feed and water enough for the day in the pen. We also left corn and water for the old mother hens. After everything was ready to, leave, we would leave for a fifty mile trip to Lake Mills, (25 miles each way), to go to the canning factory.

I don't know at that time if they canned anything besides corn or not, but I think not.

Mother, and Roger Humphrey's Mother, Josie Humphrey, drove one team and Dad and I drove the other one. About half way up there, there was a little place called Bristol. There was a small store on the west side of the road and the people that tended it lived on the east side. We would stop there and for ten or fifteen cents we would get bologna or cheese and crackers enough for our lunch. Mother would make a glass jar of coffee and wrap it in a rug and newspapers and put it down in the corner of the box of corn and that was our drink and our forenoon lunch. The people that tended the store had horses and cattle, so they had a tank of water, and they gave us permission to water our horses there.

After lunch we would continue on our way. We would take our loads of corn to the factory and unload them. For each load of corn we would get twenty four cans of corn.

Dad had an uncle and aunt living in Lake Mills. He was Worth County' Superintendent, and of the school in 'Lake Mills, and a Methodist Minister.

So he had a horse for a mode of travel and a well on the back of his lot, so we could water our horses there, and we always took our own feed for them. And the highlight of the day was havi dinner with our relatives.

We always knew that at 2 o'clock, we had to start on that long hot journey back home. There was no cover over our heads and our wagons were not air-conditioned. And it always seemed much farther home than going up there.' We would arrive home just dusk, then we had all the chores to do. To see that the little chicks were all right, get the two boxes of corn in the house, and finally have supper by a kerosene lamp. And believe me we were all ready for bed. I think it was the most tiresome day of the whole year.

Then to make the corn hold out, when we picked ears for dinner, we always seemed to get more than we ate. So Mother would cut the corn from the cooked ears that we didn't eat. We had rather a low south kitchen roof, and she would spread a sheet up on it and put the cut corn up there to dry. She would cover it with a piece of scrim, or netting so the flies and bugs couldn't get to it. And by the time the dried corn was ready to sack up, she would have quite a nice lot of dried corn to use along with the canned corn. And with the other vegetables that we had, and our sweet pickles that I have written about before, we always had plenty of tasty things to eat.

I learned in later years that the canning factory canned tomatoes and string beans besides corn, and later they came on the market and were sold in the stores.

With the rainy weather we have been having, I will leave this little verse with you:

There ain't no use to grumble and complain

I's just as cheap and easy to rejoice;

For when the Lord sorts out the weather and says, Rain

Why, rain's my choice.
