Justin keeps a sack of suet hanging on each end of the lath. He is very good help.

As I sit here, I find I have many different feathered friends feeding there. Some just summer friends and others the year around. I have the little Downy Woodpecker and how strange he is marked, with a little red stripe across his hear, that she doesn't have.

The Hairy Woodpecker is like the Downy, only larger and with the attitude that he owns the suet. I had a different one come, he had so much white on him with some black to form a V on his back. But the Audabon Bird Book does not show him, but he has all the markings of a Woodpecker.

Early in the morning a few of us neighbors have what we call"Rosie the Rivet er". It really is the Redheaded Woodpecker. It also eats suet but the thing the neighbors dislike most about her is her arrival on the chimney just at daybreak, and giving the tin covering, we all have to keep rain out of the chimney, and she gives this tin covering four or five raps and waits a minute or so and gives it somemore. You can't realize for sure what kind of an alarm clock it can be.

The little Chickadee is a busy body. She grabs a few bites and she's gone, and in a minute or so she's back again. I wonder with her busy attitude how she sets on her tiny eggs long enough for them to hatch.

The Nut Hatch is a charming little bird, a bit smaller than a robin and most all of these birds are gray black and white. She lands on the suet upside down and hangs there tofeed. I can't understand how she can swallow her food that way, but she eats until she's had enough.

This spring I had a strange experience. I had a pair of Baltimore Oreoles come to the suet to feed, they normally never eat suet. He was such a bright gold color. I think he scared all of the other birds away. He would strut across the lath to the south end and she, a little lighter yellow, would light on the north end and both would eat there. They stayed until I'm sure she had hatched her eggs, and that awful hot weather came and I think they went farther north where it was cooler.

When I could put out corn for the squirrels they would always take out the seed end from the kernel and drop the kernel on the ground. I noticed a red Cardinal coming to eat those kernels. One morning I watched longer than usual and found he wasn't swallowing that amount of kernels. He had his mouth as full as it would hold of corn and carried it to the south end of the garage, where she sat waiting. He took thr corn several times and finally got her brave enough to come after her own corn. They were beautiful red on the white snow.

The Blue Jay is a pretty bird but he is very cruel. He destroys Robins and Morning Doves eggs and nests.

About all the food a Robin eats is angle worms and the dry summers we had in the past has been very hard on them.

The Morning Dove lives on insects and those dry summers were hard on them also.

But for all of the fowls and animals that were put here on earth for out pleasure, we can group forces and do a lot. Go to your store and ask for suet and bird seed. It may cost a little but the joy you and children will receive from it will be worth the cost. Some stores will have suet with bird seed pressed into it in a bag all ready to hang. You don't need a bird feeder or anything to hang it on. Just hang it on a limb in a tree. You'll be surprised how quickly the little can smell the suet. You farmers that have corn in the field, leave a couple of rows. Those two rows won't make you rich nor break you, and you'll never know is covered with snow, there is very little they can find to eat, and to be so cold and hungry may prove fatal to them. Those who have the wild Turkeys, can throw c a few hands full of corn or small grain and it will help them a lot.

And I'll close with this, hoping that as you take inventory of your summer garden products, you will help all of our wild life live through the winter by
