Fertile Dedicates \$38,000 Gymnasium By Mrs. George F. Smith

Fertile: The new gymnasium-auditorium was dedicated Friday evening, January 3, with Ray Murray, formerly of Buffalo Center, who is administrative assistant to George Keller of the WPA, giving the principal speech. H.B. Armour, Des Moines, Don Tormy, Fort Dodge, and H.B. Sexauer from Hampton were also present.

Rev. Mr. Schmidt of Stanhope, formerly superintendent of the Fertile schools also gave a talk, and H.B. Bennet, district supervisor for the state educational department gave a talk.

The musical portion of the program was furnished by the bank, girls glee club and the girls sextette of the Fertile School.

Dinner

Earlier in the evening a dinner was served by the Fertile band mothers for the guests of honor, faculty, and school board members and their wives.

Perhaps one of the most unusual things about this gymnasium-auditorium is the fact that the limestone on the exterior of the building came from the rock quarry here in Fertile. Another feature is that there are no posts or pillars to obstruct the view of the spectators. The roof is supported by four large arches, made of laminated boards, stained walnut. To add both to the exterior and interior beauty of the building, the whole front from the top of the bleachers to the arched roof contains clear glass windows.

Size of Building

The building itself measures 86 a 84 feet excluding the corridor running beside the old building which is 10 x 80 feet. The basketball court alone which runs east and west, measures 42×76 feet.

The interior of the building is one of the most beautiful in the state. The walls six feet, eight inches from the floor are stained walnut, paneled off in blocks sixteen inches by eight feet, with gilt paint. Above this the wall is finished in Nu Wood blocked off with red stripping. This Nu Wood absorbs sound, thus improving the acoustics. The arched ceiling is decorated in tan and white, off-set by a small strip of red moulding running next to the arches. Sixteen recessed floodlights, four in each arch, illuminate the auditorium.

Seats 500

Ample space is provided for spectators at basketball games, for the eight rows of bleachers, 84 feet long, on the south side of the basketball court, seat approximately 500 people. These bleachers are so constructed as to provide plenty of foot space for all spectators. This is done by having a raised plank about half the width of the regular bleacher seats on which the spectators sit. Chairs may be placed on the basketball floor to provide additional seating room at plays or music concerts.

The space beneath the bleachers is well utilized. There is a school board room 18 x 12 feet at the east end and a fire proof safe in which to keep school records besides the 65×23 foot manual training room. At the west end of the manual training room is a large door opening unto a driveway so that in the future it may be possible to drive tractors or trucks right into the shop room.

Auditorium

To the north of the basketball floor is the 60 x 16 foot stage. The curtains for the stage consist of the mulberry velour front curtains and the beige side, back, and drop curtains. The side curtains make it possible to vary the width of the stage from 30 to 60 feet. Under the front part of the stage is a storage space for chairs and beneath the stage itself are two dressing rooms, the one on the east used by the girls, the other by the boys, each equipped with showers. Between these also is a storage room. Above the stairs leading to these rooms are small dressing rooms, one on each side of the stage which can be used when plays are to be presented.

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Heating System

The main entrance of the gymnasium-auditorium on the east side, opens into a corridor between the two buildings. The ticket booth is located just north of the main door to the gymnasium. In about the middle of the corridor, built into the east wall is a large trophy case. A doorway to the north end leads into a hall of the old building between the home economics room and the bandroom. A checkroom is built into the east wall of the main room of the gymnasium.

The main room of the gymnasium is heated by four steam air units. One is located on each side of the stage, one over the stage itself and the fourth one is located over the east end of the bleachers. The steam for these units is produced by the boiler of the old school building.

The construction of the building has taken approximately one year. Very little of the labor was skilled, almost all of it being furnished by the WPA men.' Mr. William Lewis of Des Moines, the foreman, was rock mason. Of the total cost of the construction of this gymnasium-auditorium, \$38,000, the WPA furnished \$23,000 The approximate cost of the building per cubic foot was \$14.75 which is very low.

Other Changes

Many changes have also been made in the old building since the construction of the new gymnasium-auditorium. One of the most important of these is the moving of the first and second grade room down into the old home economics room, which in turn has been moved to the former manual training room. This year instead of sitting at desks as previously, the first and second grades have little tables and chairs. Cupboards along the walls provide space for the work books, pencils, and colors, and other materials used by the little folks. On the west wall a lavoratory and drinking fountain have been installed, and to make it still more convenient, the adjoining room, which has been used for showers, was made into two washrooms, one for the boys and one for the girls. The room that was formerly occupied by the first and second grades is now the seventh and eighth grade room thus giving the high school an additional class room.

New Equipment

The new home economics room has been much improved over the old one. It is now divided into four kitchens, each completely equipped with stove, sink, and table. In addition there are three large wall cupboards and a serving window.

The old gymnasium has also been completely revised. It is now divided into two rooms, a band room and a play room for the primary pupils. The bank room is finished in the same NuWood as the gymnasium, making it sound proof.

The WPS also contributed labor to these changes made in the building.

This community is certainly fortunate to have such a fine building for its use. Not only will it instill more interest in the people for their school and its activities, but the students will feel more like working in athletics, musicals and declamatory projects.

In August of 1968, after graduating from high school in May, my father said, "you've got to figure out what you're going to do with your life because you're not living here forever."

I decided to give beauty school a try. In September of "68" I enrolled in Rochester Beauty School, Rochester, Minn. My first haircut on the floor had a triple cowlic on the top of her head. Nobody had told me about cowlics. Her hair stood straight up all over her head by the time I was done. She cried, I cried, and my instructor was very angry. I swore I'd never cut hair again.

I acquired my license a year later from Minnesota and on to Iowa I came. Even 25 years ago people were moving home to their parents. Poor Dad. I attended La'James Beauty School and acquired my Iowa license.

The best advice I ever got was from my dad who said, "no job is going to be perfect, but decide what you're going to do, and then be the best at it you can be." I think Oriville Reddenbocker must have known my dad.

I worked in Forest City for 3 years at the Forrester. I was very fortunate there. After two months, Joyce Stever Russell, from Fertile left the Forrester and went to work for Winnebago and I got all her ladies. My first pay check was for \$33.50, and I thought I was loaded. So did my dad. By the next month I was moved into my first self supported apartment for \$60.00 a month. Thanks dad. It was the best thing you could have done for me. I learned to make it on my own. I lived on my own for 2 years and then married Tom.

Haircut prices were \$1.50 and shampoo sets were \$1.75. Everyone wore backcombing and washed their hair only once a week. We started cutting mens hair in about 1970. One half of my business today is men.

Permanents ranged from \$10.00 to \$15.00. Coloring hair has always been my least favorite thing to do (you never know what you're going to get, and I don't like surprises!

After working in Forest City for 3 years I went to Mason City and taught school at La'James for a year. I couldn't keep my hands off peoples hair so I decided I had to do the actual work again.

I then went to Clear Lake and worked with Elenor Wubben who taught me everything about people and hair that I hadn't learned in school. I worked there for a year. I have many of the first customers I did when I was in Clear Lake and I can honestly say there isn't one of my customers I don't like. I feel fortunate for that.

Tom and I then opened our own shop north of Clear Lake for 3 years and we've been in our home in Fertile 14, years. I always include Tom in the ownership because without his help I'd never be able to have my own shop. He's the one that fixes all the equipment, moves all the snow, puts gravel on the driveway when it's slippery, taxis's people around in bad weather, etc., etc.

The only two disadvantages of having a shop in our home is that the phone rings seven days a week and at all hours. The second is having your work downstairs and never having a breathing time from work to family. When you drive somewhere to work, you have time getting there to make the seperation.

All in all, I've enjoyed my work very much and I'm looking forward to many more years of doing just what I'm doing right now - Trying to give everyone "The Personal Touch".
