ERTILE is one of the oldest and most substantial towns in Worth County, dating from the advent of the arrival of Wm. Rhodes, on August 6th, 1856, who erected the first house, 14x18 feet in size, with a Dutch fireplace at one end. His first venture was in a saw mill, which he constructed and operated. In 1868 this was supplemented with a grist mill. The next to arrive and settle hereabouts were Wm. K. Fankell and E. S. Winans, in 1857. The first child born here was John Fenton Rhodes, December 1, 1861. The first marriage was M. O. Blackmore and Louise Fankell, which occurred July 2, 1868. The first death was a daughter of Luther Place, during the winter of 1856-7. The village was platted during the year 1877, and the plat thereof filed for record August 21st of the same year. The first store was opened in

1872 by Ole Ouverson in a small frame building. In 1874 K. Paulson was admitted as a partner. In 1875 this business was transferred to Messrs. Grove & Kirk, the postoffice being combined with it, with A. A. Grove as postmaster. Gunder K. Daley started the first blacksmith and wagon shop in 1870. Halver Ouverson was next in this line in 1875. Dr. J. R. Jones was the first physician, arriving in 1878, and in 1879 he put in the first drug store. The past twenty years has wrought many changes in Fertile, and the future holds out even more for it. Situated as it is in one of the best farming and stock-raising sections of the country, traversed by Beaver and Lime rivers, affording excellent irrigation and pasturage, and manned by a doterie of merchants of the "do or die" character, whose aggressiveness mate well with their progressiveness, and the new enterprises which are continually springing up and maturing, it is destined in the near future to eclipse all its former records of progress and prosperity. With its Mill, Brick & Tile Works, Peat Plant, Co-Operative Lumber Yard, Co-Operative Creamery, strong financial institution, three general merchandise stores, hardware store, drug store, furniture store, two blacksmith shops, hotel, barber and shoe shops, splendid school and church buildings, it stands out pre-eminently-a beacon light throwing its rays in every direction-- and attracting trade beyond its territory. The town was incorporated April 17th. 1908, and the following officers installed: Mayor, E. M. Lang; Councilmen, A. A. Elthon, P. J. Ouverson, J. A. Johnson, J. A. Ellefson, O. H. Rholl; Clerk, C. Eikenberry; Treasurer, J. F. Rhodes; Assessor, G. A. Rye. All are representative business men, enthusiastic in the advancement line, and will acquit themselves in their usual characteristic manner. It is proposed to first establish a grade, after which new sidewalks will be constructed, a "new dress" donned, so to speak, and an invitation extended to new enterprises, relying upon their past achievements and future prospects, which were never more effulgent than at the present day, to accomplish that for which they have so long sought -supremacy in every sense of the word.

## We Won! Neil L. Kuns December 20, 1993

It is probably difficult for anyone who grew up in a city where there are many magnets to hold the community together to understand how important the public school is to a small town. The PTA meetings, High School plays, and especially the basketball games were events that galvanized the citizens into one unit. *Any* game was a social event, but when the team was *good*, the game was the *finals* of the Worth County Tournament, and Fertile was *hosting* the contest, the whole town turned out to cheer on the boys.

For the tournament extra bleachers were erected on the stage, which ran along the whole north side of the basketball floor. Those were filled with people, as were the regular seats on the south side. The score board was hung high on the west wall of the gym and was controlled from the scorer's table, on the stage at the center line. When my dad built the score board he added a loud horn to signal the end of regulation time. There was only one time I recall being unable to hear it when it sounded -- the final game of the Worth County Tournament, 1944.

School superintendent Art Grooters, the most honest, stable, and unflappable person in the school, was controlling the score-board that night. From the beginning it was apparent that this was going to be a **championship game**. Both teams were playing up to their potential, and the lead changed hands repeatedly during the first two eight minute quarters. Band music, refreshments and relief filled the half time, and as the third quarter neared the teams returned to the floor and shot their warm-up baskets. The competing cheer leaders exhorted their respective fans to greater enthusiasm.

I should tell you that the competition for the home team that night was Northwood, the county seat, the largest and the only "class A" school in the county. Because of their smaller enrollments all the other county schools were "class B". Every other team in Worth County wanted to beat Northwood, but it was never an easy task.

The second half seemed even closer that the first, with neither team able to break out to any comfortable lead. Time ticked away to less than a minute, and with less than five seconds remaining Fertile had the lead, but Northwood had the ball, in their court, the east end of the gym, far from the score board. When they missed their shot and the time ran out the noise was so loud that *no one* -- not the players, not the referees, and not the crowd could hear the horn signaling the end of the game. There was one person who was watching the clock very carefully, Art Grooters. When time ran out so did he. He jumped down onto the playing floor. Waving his arms frantically over his head, he ran out to the officials to tell them the game was over. He wanted to make sure that in the excitement no more shots were taken.

I have watched hundreds of college and professional games on the tube since then, and some of them have been very exciting, but for sheer drama and excitement none could compare to the intensity of that night in 1944 when we won the county championship by defeating Northwood. These were the boys who played on the ball team Neil is writing about. <u>1st team</u>: Norman Brue, Loren (Bill) Nissen, Stanley Pederson, Earl Humphrey and Frank Sheimo. <u>Subs</u>: Ardie Lovick, Glenn Hanson, Arvid Holtan, Kenneth Lemke and Pat Nissen.
