Christmas at the Farm

Neil L. Kuns November 29, 1993

About once or twice a month during the time I lived at home, Dad drove the family out to Grandpa and Grandma Kuns' house, twelve miles north-west of Forest City. It was a pleasant drive, something to do on a Sunday after church, and, since my cousins lived close by and they too were frequently there, it was almost always fun. There was the barn in which we could play, the grove which we could explore, the animals to watch, and many opportunities for kids who knew how to entertain themselves.

On a Sunday in late October or early November someone, usually Grandma Kuns, would say it was time to draw names for the Christmas gift exchange. The names of all family members were written on pieces of paper, folded, and put into a bowl or hat, and each one drew the name of the person to whom he would give a gift on Christmas Day. It never mattered whose name you drew, but it sometimes made a difference who got *your* name (some of the uncles and aunts were more apt and able to be generous than others). The price range was agreed upon and the names kept secret until the gift exchange on Christmas afternoon.

We always had our own gift unwrapping on Christmas morning, as early as Dale and I could arrange, and as late as Mom and Dad could manage. We planned to get out to the farm around noon. Darlene Holland was the cousin nearest my age. She and I always tried to beat the other in saying, "Merry Christmas!" to the other at the west porch door where we entered the house.

Grandma baked a turkey, candied yams, mincemeat and pumpkin pies, and cooked and prepared all the trimmings for a feast. When it was all ready we gathered around the big table in the dining room. There were twenty-six of us when everyone was present. The adults sat at the table and the kids at other tables around the house. After dinner and after the dishes were done the whole clan met in the living room for the "program". All of us who had learned a "piece" for the Christmas program at our church were encouraged to say it. It took some prodding to persuade some us to recite, but we all understood this was a prelude to the gift exchange, and therefor we didn't resist too long. Grandpa and Grandma were dedicated Christians and relished hearing their grandchildren perform in this way.

The gifts from Grandpa and Grandma were always clothes -- a sweater or shirt or blouse, and in those depression and war years, were always appreciated, at least by the parents. The exchange gifts were the surprise and these were usually games or toys, which would be promptly tried out, and hopefully not broken before the day was over. We also always got a sack of nuts in the shell, hard candy, and an apple. Our grandparents would buy in bulk and sack the goodies during the preceding days.

Grandpa's birthday was on Christmas Day, and, while he may have felt neglected, he never said so and no one ever forgot him. It was an additional reason for everyone to be present.

Grandma had a box of food prepared for each family as they left at the end of the day. It contained loaves of home-baked bread, butter, left-over turkey, perhaps a pie, and other surprises. The twenty-five mile drive home in the dark was a time to reflect on the activities of the day, and to remember the funny and good things that had come about as we spent another Christmas at the farm.
