Oh, Vas You Comin' Home?

Neil L. Kuns December 2, 1993

I was sitting in the coffee shop at Nordstrom the other day, waiting for Elaine to return from shopping -- my *second* most favorite thing to do. At least the coffee was good. As I waited my mind wandered back to a certain Saturday night in Fertile, Iowa, during the early 1940's, when one of the old Norwegian farmers had a similar problem to my own at that moment. (Waiting for wives is an ancient aggravation.)

They had come into town together to do the week's trading and grocery shopping at one of the two stores across the street from each other. He had drunk his bladder full with Carl Fredrickson's coffee at the Cozy Nook Cafe, and had stood and watched the passing scene on Main Street as long as he could stand it. The time for his wife to meet him had come and gone. It wasn't a long line at the cash register that had detained her, but a long line of conversation which knew neither the time nor when to quit. Without taking his arms out of their folded position within his bib overalls he looked carefully in both directions and on both sides of the street and couldn't see her.

Only the farmer knew if it was all that coffee or all the waiting which caused him to go, but go he did, first to his car and then to his farm.

At length "the Missus" finished talking and went to meet "the Mister", but she couldn't locate him, either in the cafe or on the street. She went to where the car had been parked, and it was *gone*. A nebulous Norwegian nervousness started nibbling at her neck and she went to "central", right across the street from the Lime Rock Cafe. Amy Nye was still there, sitting at the telephone office switch-board in front of the window, it not yet being nine o'clock. From this vantage point Amy or her assistant, Myna Smith, could look out the window and see everything and every one who was on Main Street, whether or not they were moving. They served as un-official eyes for the whole town. Most people didn't appreciate them enough for the long hours they kept nor for the information they provided.

The Missus went in and asked Amy to "ring up" the farm to see if "Nels" (a fictitious name to protect him and all of us who also sit or stand and wait) 'vas at home.' He *was* and answered the phone. A mixture of relief and exasperation was in her voice as she told him he had left her in town. Of course, it *wasn't* news to him. In his most melodic Norwegian lilt he asked, "Oh, vas you comin' home?"

He drove back into town and picked her up. No one else was privy to their conversation as they returned to the country, but I have it on good authority, that the Missus never tarried too long talking on Saturday night after that incident. nor did "Nels" ever again go home without her.

I know that women wait for men also, and the thought of leaving a very late mate stranded may well have entered the minds of many people in similar situations. We probably would never actually *do* it for most of us do not live in as benign an environment as was found in Fertile during the 40's.

"AS PUTSY WAS"

Get into the car, I will take you "back" to Putsy as "it was" in 1947, 48, 49.

On our left is the beautiful old Church of ist. It has a large balcony, sanctuary and basement. Mrs. Harley Ouverson is the organist. The parsonage is the 2nd house.

On the corner is a garage and a gas station. Ernie Kuns is manager.

Across the street, south, on the corner is the Fertile Hardware and Lumber. It has something unique. There were so many bridal showers after the war. You didn't go out of town shopping for a gift, you just picked up the phone, called either hardware (there were 2), asked the clerk to put your name on the \$1.00 or \$2.00 list and at the day of the shower it was totaled. The bride-to-be received a beautiful or more than one gift.

Next to the hardware is the creamery. Scotty Faulken is the buttermaker, wearing his white cap and overalls.

Now, on main street, we are in front of the Mission Hall. It is a branch of the Baptist Church.

Next is a building owned by "Bud" Jenkins. He has stoves, his tools, etc.

Across the street is "Cozy Nook" Next is the Post Office.

Across the street, on the right, is the Lelephone office. Aimee Nye and Myna Smith are operators. Bless their hearts! A 7-day week job. Aimee raised 2 fine sons working a 7-day week job.

Next is a store managed by Oscar Brue. He had a "charesmatic touch" - a rather gentle voice - loved to chat.

Across the street is Max's Cafe. It had booths and a horse shoe counter. They served breakfasts and a noon meal.

By Max's Cafe is the Elthon Pioneer store. They have groceries in the front and a meat department in back. Downstairs you will find dry goods, coveralls, overalls, jackets, overshoes and guns.

On the corner is the Fertile Locker managed by Delton Davis. So nice to come here for frozen beef or pork.

Across, on my right, on the corner is the Bank. Yes, a bank-a-branch of the one at Hanlontown. Sophie Deuel is bank clerk.

Across the street is another hardware, managed by Willard and Katie Thovson. Katie has such a beautiful display of dishes and latest in pots and pans.

Here, on my left, is another gas station, managed by Reuben Rodberg.

Then, comes the landmark of Fertile, the mill. Our son, David, lives in Golden, Co. He visited Georgetown, one day and saw a beautiful painted picture of the Fertile Mill by Dave Priebe of Minneapolis. He bought it and gave it to us.

Next is another little gas station. Leo Ouverson is in charge.

I'll turn the corner, go a block north and turn west. There is the beautiful Fertile School. See that big "tunnel slide" on the back of it? (

Next is Fertile Lutheran Church. In the early years, till now, (1945) the "style" was men sat on one side - women on the other.

Across the street is the Fertile Hatchery, run by Harley Ouverson.

Let's turn back to the schoolhouse - Why? Bless her heart! Ruth Ouverson has opened the "Old School Cafe" - open 6:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. She serves breakfasts and lunches. Her french toast isn't a thin slice of bread, but a nice, thick slice of homemade bread.

Yes, Fertile was a thriving town, consisting of 3 churches, 3 stations, 2 hardware stores, 2 cafes, 2 stores, a bank, a post office and a telephone office.

It's still a thriving town, I think.

with the postmastership ever since. The second business enterprise in the town was that of the Farmer's Savings Bank with C. H. McNider, President, and K. S. Paulson, Cashier. Hammer & Malmin were second, in 1901, in the general merchandise line. The first child born was Glen Ingwell, who was born February 28th, 1901. The first death was that of Alpha Hovrud, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jul Hovrud. Holsted & Erickson conducted the first hardware store, commencing in 1901. Tom Anderson was the first blacksmith. This town never had a boom, but has enjoyed a steady, healthy growth, until today she ranks second to none of its size in the country. The more recent additions in the commercial field will be taken up later-but suffice it to say here that they are of sterling quality, and that other enterprises are forthcoming, notably the erection of a creamery, which is now in course of construction, and will be in operation June 1st of this year. The territory tributary to Joice is of the very best, and the grain and stock market afforded here attracts the attention to such a degree as to make this a busy mart at all seasons. The signs are now, more than ever, multiplying idicative of an effulgent future for Joice. The merchants of today are down-to-date, and are putting the right hand forward unto everything that would enhance the expectations of the survival of the fittest. The past two years has witnessed many strides of advancement with Joice -- three new firms of a substantial character, having cast anchor and declared their intentions of remaining there. This year will find many improvements in the street and sidewalk lines, also a proposition for a new public school build has been carried to a successful end, costing \$2,000, all of which the year will bring forth. Another voucher for enthusiasm among the business men is the splendid support given their band, composed of twenty instruments, all of whom are said to be proficient in their parts. The population surrounding Joice so adhere to her every wish that she is enjoying an enviable business, all of which is meritorious and appreciated.
