Chicken Little Neil L. Kuns April 6, 1994

During my childhood one of the thriving small businesses in Fertile was Harley Ouverson's Fertile Valley Hatchery. Harley had large incubators in which fertile eggs were hatched into fluffy yellow chicks. We used to like to visit the large room in which all the action was taking place. When the time for the eggs to hatch arrived, it was truly amazing. Where one day there were only trays of eggs warming within a large electric "nest", the next day there were hundreds of little peeping chickens.

Some of the farmers ordered layers (female chickens or pullets) because they were interested in producing eggs. Others were more interested in raising fryers (male chickens or roosters). This called for another step in the process before the chicks were placed in large corrugated boxes with air holes and shipped out. The hatchery would hire inspectors to come in and "sex" the chicks. All of these "sexperts" seemed to be Japanese, for reasons I never did figure out. They would pick up the chicks, pinch their bottoms and, under a bright light, glance at the strategic, if immature, organs and separate the boys from the girls. I could never tell the difference, with chickens, that is.

Harley had high standards for his chicks, and if they were under sized they were culled out from those which were counted and sold. The kids in town would sometimes persuade him to let them have the culls to raise in our back yards. We would then have to keep them warm and fed. At first we would buy the "mash" or chicken feed, but after awhile they could eat more commonly available food.

The Fertile Mill, the oldest enterprise in town, was in the business of shelling and selling corn, as well as grinding and mixing livestock feed to order. The cobs from which the corn had been shelled were shot out of a chute onto a pile on the ground west of the mill. There were always kernels of corn left on those cobs, and we would glean this grain to feed our "chicken littles," our struggling culls. Before the chicks had grown enough to eat the kernels whole, the corn had to be "cracked" or ground. I accomplished this be running it through an antique coffee grinder which Grandma Carr subsequently gave to me, and which I still treasure. A handful of corn went into the top of the hopper, and then I would set the grind to coarse or fine as desired, and turn the crank until the cracked corn was all in the little drawer in the bottom. Soon "chicken little" had his lunch.

It was fascinating to watch the wee creatures get their first feathers, and to listen to the fledgling roosters trying to learn how to crow. Some of the chicks never had a chance, and were always under-sized. Others grew as well as if they had been premium stock. When the inevitable day came for them to keep their date with the frying pan, it was Grandma Carr who dispatched them to the "happy pecking ground." After we had captured the chicken *du jour she* would get the axe, stretch the chicken's neck atop a stump, chop off its head, and, after it stopped flopping around, pluck it and prepare it for the kitchen.

In those days nothing came easily. Learning how much time and effort are required to bring a chicken to the dinner table is probably one of the more important lessons life has taught me. I hope I never forget it.



HINTS

When using aluminum foil to wrap food to bake or reheat in the oven, or when reheating covered casseroles, be sure to keep the shiny side in, as the foil will absorb more heat. When the shiny side is out, it reflects heat and slows the heating process.

For best results getting stains or set-in grease out of clothing pour liquid dish washing soap on stains and let set overnight. Wash as usual the next day.
