The Fertile City Council met in gular session on Tues., Nov. 7,1995 with Mayor Elthon presiding and all council members present.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Thompson has been unable to get information from Lehigh Cement on riprap for the lagoon.

Animal control does include cats.

Thompson reported a bid of \$81,600 to remove the old building at the Community Center. One more person will be contacted for a price.

Televising of a portion of the sewer system will be done the week of Nov. 13. All manholes have been found and raised.

Council discussed repairing the roof of the bus barn. It was felt the building isn't worth repairing and should be removed. Council will get an estimate on repairing the roof. No trespassing signs are up at the old building at the Community Center and all first story windows will be arded up.

Discussion on a street light at the horseshoe court in the park. Light that is there works and will have a photocell installed on it.

Motion to pay Henry Thompson for 6 hours labor to raise manholes and to pay Bob Haugen \$30 per hour for 12 hours use of his backhoe. Carried.

City will advertise for snow removal on Main St.

Ice skating rink will be at the pond west of the tennis court in the park. It will be flooded for skating. Volunteers will be needed to supervise.

Council discussed plans for a Fertile Days Celebration for 1996.

Les Zearing will need to provide an itemized list of hours worked, by day, job and hours. Because of complaints, Les will be reading the meters. Council wished to thank all who helped clean the park this Fall.

Total cost to TV sewer lines will be about \$3,000 slightly higher than was budgeted. Motion to complete the sewer work. Carried.

Park cleaning will be done 1 PM on Oct. 29th. Signs will be put up in businesses. City will provide marshmallows to roast and pop.

- Les Zearing, city maintenance man asked for a raise to \$900 monthly. Felland said she was against the raise; but suggested he look into schooling so he would be licensed by state, so we could use him as a full time maintenance man, taking care of the water and sewer systems. Dave Low is paid \$301.41 monthly for his maintenance of If Les the sewer and water system. were licensed he would qualify for that job detail. Then, maybe council consider a fixed salary on a monthly basis. Zearing now works 30 hours weekly. Motion to raise wages to \$7 per hour. Les has worked for the city over 2 years with no raise since hired. Carried. New rate will start Nov. 1st. Les will report to council on availability of schooling and the cost. City council would require a written contract agreement with Les for a commitment of service for the city. Meeting adjourned.

### Trimming The Tree Neil L. Kuns December 14, 1994

As I've driven the city streets for the last ten days I've noticed more and more cars carrying Christmas trees on their tops or in their trunks. Everyone seems to be getting serious about Christmas. All the commercial hype, made-for-television yuletide programs and advertising is one thing, but Christmas doesn't really come home until the tree is in the house, mounted in the stand and trimmed. The smell of the needles is enchanting and at night the aura of the colored lights is entrancing. Other decorations might suggest the season and enhance the house, but a trimmed tree says Christmas is here.

The variety of trees available these days is far greater than it was when I was a child. One may purchase a shaped spruce, a long-needle Scottish pine, or a noble fir with upward pointing short bluish-green needles, plain or flocked with fake snow. Such a tree is gorgeous but "gosh-awful" expensive. Some excuse this extravagance by explaining, "Christmas comes only once a year." The trees which were available at the grocery stores in Fertile, Iowa, were short needle firs, and ranged in height from two to six feet. Because the tree holder Dad had made for us could handle a trunk with a maximum diameter of less than two inches, our tree was never more than four or five feet tall.

Each family evolves its own personalized approach to decorating the evergreen. We always started with the lighting. Light strands have been improved over the years, and one failed bulb no longer darkens the entire string. Do you remember how frustrating it was to search out the one which wasn't working? That was usually the first item of importance in trimming the tree, and might be done even before the tree was brought into the house. Our tree was usually set up near a front window so it could be seen from the outside when it was lighted at night. The lights were evenly distributed around the tree from top to bottom and their colorful foil reflectors were then mounted behind the bulbs. I liked to mismatch the colors of reflectors and bulbs, putting a red one on a blue light and a yellow reflector on a green bulb. The larger gold-colored five-pointed star always went on top of the tree with a clear bulb in its center. It was the only fitting place for the Bethlehem star.

The garlands and ornaments were next added to the tree, and the last of the decorations were the tin foil icicles. These were real tin, and were saved and re-used from year to year. One of the last tasks in taking down the tree after Christmas was reclaiming the icicles, folding them over their cardboard holder, and replacing them in the box of decorations. This task was usually done by New Year's Day.

The tree took on a magical air when it was all dressed up, even though it looked rather scrawny when we first brought it home from the store. Still, it was a good value for the twenty-five or fifty cents we paid for a tree in those days. After the tree had served its time in the house it was unceremoniously taken outside, still wearing a few of the tin icicles which it refused to relinquish. Here with all of its similar discards it became another green ghost of Christmas past and a signal that Christmas was over.

- $2\frac{1}{2}$  cups minature marshmallows

2 lb almond bark or white fudge

Melt fudge in double boiler and mix all together. You may chop the peanuts if desired.
