## Rolling, Rolling, Rolling Neil L. Kuns June 1, 1994

Roller-blading has so captured the imagination of today's youth and young at heart that old-fashioned roller skates are almost a forgotten relic of the past. Colored plastic wheels and shoes helps make them attractive to kids and those who are kids at heart. As for me, I still remember the old all metal clamp-ons we wore to wheel around town on the cement. Since the sidewalks had cracks and holes we had to stay alert to keep from falling. Sometimes not even that could keep us on our feet.

Forest City and Clear Lake had permanent skating rinks, but those were ten miles away, and not at all convenient. Herb and Don Garloch brought a temporary rink to Fertile for the summers of 1947 and '48, and set it up north of the alley at the end of State Street. There was no road through that open area in those days. The floor of the rink was smooth, the tent cover was open and airy on all sides, the activity was wholesome exercise, and the place became quite popular. Very few people had their own shoe skates at first, so the rink rented out the clamp-on variety of skates with smooth, wide composition wheels to would-be roller skaters. The price of rolling was reasonable, and there wasn't much other recreational activity in town other than the river. Not many of us went fishing or swimming after dark.

The Garloch brothers played recorded popular music over the sound system, and this helped remove the boredom which could set in if people tried to skate endless laps like caged animals in a zoo. My favorite song was *Rose of San Antonio*, and even today whenever I hear the tune I think of the rink. Traffic flowed counter-clockwise except for the final "all skate" of the night which was also a "reverse skate." I never understood why that was necessary. Variety was introduced by having waltzes, couples only skates, ladies' choice couple skates and the like. Each evening there would be at least one "moonlight waltz" during which the bright lights would be turned off, and couples would glide over the floor. It was a good time for single skaters to rest.

The rink was open nearly every night and afternoons on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. This gave time for younger and learning skaters to get in on the fun without getting into the way of the more able adults who preferred the evening time for their recreation. Not all of the adults were that "able" or agile. Some of them also enjoyed the afternoon skating.

Our church had held a picnic lunch one day, and several of us went skating after that was over. One lad a year or two older than I am had come into town for the picnic bare footed. That was not at all unusual in itself in those days, but it became a problem for him later that afternoon. He too decided to go skating, came up to Don Garloch at the counter with his coins and asked for some skates. Only clamp-on skates were available, and the wishful would-be skater hadn't anticipated that detail. Don eye-balled his bare feet and asked, "How are you planning to wear them? You've got to have shoes, kid!" He was embarrassed, turned beet red and giggled with his tongue between his teeth. Garloch looked at him like something other than shoes was missing.

After the second season when school started the tent was taken down and the poles and floor sections were placed in storage. The next summer rolled around, but the rink masters didn't return. Another chapter in my small town's history had been written, but not forgotten.
