January Council Minutes

- Happy New Year -

Council members Thompson, Tuttle, Bruns, Russell and Olson were present.

The following items were discussed:

- 1. The council approved an opportunity for Fertile to be involved in applying for a Community Development Block Grant to rehabilitate owner occupied properties. The funding would assist in rehabilitation projects to include roofing, furnaces, plumbing, electrical etc. Three homes, with household incomes below 80% of the county median would be eligible. The city will match \$2,000 per home if the grant is accepted.
- 2. A third reading of increased sewer rates was approved. The rates will increase to \$25 for the sewer only beginning February 1, 2001. As a reminder, all of those individuals with private wells within city limits are required to have city water/sewer services by January 1, 2002.
- 3. North Iowa Area Council of Governments (NACOG) has been hired to assist in the revisions of the city ordinances for \$1,800. This process will begin in late spring.
- 4. The library budget was presented. An increase of \$4,000 was asked of the city council. Final decisions on budget matters will be discussed at the budget hearing (date yet to be set). It was noted that the circulation of the library is greater in Fertile than in the surrounding small towns and it is the only accredited library in the region.
- 5. Yaggy Colby representative Terry McCarthypresented the steps of a Phase I Preliminary Investigation of the plan to assess and remediate infiltration and inflow within the sewer system. The following steps will occur:
- > Evaluate drain tile systems within the City
- > Evaluate overall sewage system layout
- > Evaluate lift station pumping records
- > Evaluate information from past efforts to correct the problem
- Evaluate information provided by current and past city staff
- Evaluate information provided by community members
- > Perform a manhole condition survey
- > Perform high flow level monitoring in manholes
- > Prepare a report of findings

- > The council and city clerk as a cost saving measure will gather information.
- 6. The USDA annual budget for the water and sewer is due the 15th. The clerk reported that the water account is operating at a \$7,000 loss With the recent sewer rate each year. increase, the sewer account will end the year with a positive balance. The USDA will no longer tolerated this loss and the city must do something to improve the financial status. The council has decided that the water rates for 2,000 and under gallons will start at \$14.50. For each 1,000 gallons there after the charge will increase by \$1.50 increments. For each year, beginning in 2002, water rates will increase based on the cost of living increase. This was the first reading of the proposed change in water rates.
- 7. Due to time restraints, the 2001-2002 budget will be addressed in the Feb. meeting with a public budget hearing to be set in early March.

NEWS FROM CITY COUNCIL

As we enter the new year, our town, like many others, faces many challenges that test our success as a community. One of the most important issues to be addressed is our sanitary sewer collection and treatment system. The City has, for some time, been out of compliance with maximum influent (sewage) flow limits established in our National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. In short, we have been exceeding the maximum flow limits specified in our permit. The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) has required that the City undertake necessary actions that will result in compliance with permit limits. The cause of excessive sewage flows is known to be infiltration and inflow (I/I) of water sources (other than sewage) into our system. Examples of I/I are as follows:

<u>Infiltration</u> ~ Infiltration is generally described as water that enters the sewer system through cracks or holes in pipes, leaking pipe joints, service and manhole connections or manhole walls.

<u>Inflow</u> ~ Inflow is generally described as water that enters the sewer system from sources such as roof drains, sump pumps, foundation drains, cooling water discharges, manhole covers, surface area drains and cross connections with storm sewer and/or drainage tiles.

The City Council has already begun the process to address this issue. The preliminary investigation phase has started. The result of the evaluation will be a plan of action for the reduction of I/I that can be submitted to the IDNR by February 28, 2001. However, <u>community action</u> cannot stop there. We must carry through with the implementation of our plan of action. The result, hopefully, will be our compliance with permit requirements. The City Council intends to follow a systematic step-by-step approach that will yield the most cost-effective solution to resolve the problem.

Your cooperation and understanding in this matter is crucial if we are to successfully achieve our goal.





Rubber Ice Neil L. Kuns December 27, 1993

Last week one of my associates read my recent piece about the "Winter River", and asked about "rubber ice", having never before heard the phrase. How many experiences do we have filed away in our own memories which others have never experienced? Probably more than we realize.

Rubber ice was usually a function of a winter thaw and the approaching of Springtime. As the days grew warmer the snow started melting and the water began its unstoppable surge toward the Gulf of Mexico, hundreds of miles away. We frequently tried to dam up the roadside rivulets when we were children, but the water always won, and washed away our efforts. With gravity pulling at it the warmer water made its way into the river and began flowing beneath the ice. Usually we could sense what was happening by the ice level being higher than it had been all Winter. The warmer water also began thawing the ice from below, and that which had been solid since the first good freeze began to lose its integrity. That was when it became dangerous and the mothers in town began to warn their offspring with stories of children who had fallen through the ice, gotten caught beneath harder ice, and had drown. It always sounded ghastly, which was probably the mothers' exact intention.

One "springish" day I had been playing in the park south of the dam. Late in the afternoon I decided to take a shortcut on my way home. We were living on First Street at the time so it must have been about1943 or 1944. I began to cross the river below the dam and was immediately aware of the rubber ice. Remembering those stories I became very cautious, testing each step before putting my weight down and proceeding. I was about half way across the stream when, *suddenly* and *without warning*, the ice below me gave way and I was up to my neck in the frigid water. My arms flew out, and, fortunately, I kept my head and kept it above the water. As I tried to get out the ice kept breaking away, but after several attempts, I was able to pull myself onto some solid ice and to crawl to the north bank and get out.

It was a long, cold walk to the house that day, and the river water was beginning to refreeze by the time I arrived home. I don't remember getting "yelled at" but I do recall how good it was to get into warm and dry clothing.

After that experience I had a new respect for the dangers and the deceitfulness of "rubber ice". Someone has said, "If you're going to walk on rubber ice, you might as well dance." That probably is another way of saying, "Only fools walk on rubber ice" or "Stay off of the stuff." I certainly would agree.

CREAM CHEESE PUMPKIN MUFFINS

1) mix WELL & refrigerate (can be made a day ahead 2) Stir together topping

1 - 802 Cream Cheese softened. 1 beaten egg 2 Tbsp. sugar (2/3 cup coconut or oatmeal 1/2 cup chopped/peclans 3 TBSP sugar 1/2 +sp. cinnamon) (2 1/4 c. flour tsp baking powder 2 top cinnamon 1/2 salt · 1/4 tsp soda 4) Mix this well then (2 beaten eggs add to flow Mixture 1/4 cup oil and stir till moistened 1/2 tsp vanilla 1 1/4 cup pumpkin) Fill muffin cups 1/3 full, then put a rounded tsp of filling in the center of each. Fill to 3/4 full & sprinkle with topping. Bake at 375° for 20 minutes. Makes 2 doz. OR make 1 doz. muffins a marble the remaining batter in an 8" round pan to make a coffee cake. 350° 30 minutes.
