February Council Minutes

Council members Thompson, Tuttle, Olson, Bruns and Russel were present.

The following items were discussed:

- The second reading of the change in water rates was approved. The proposed reading states, "the minimum water rate will begin at \$14.50 for 2,000 gallons and under and then increasing by \$1.50 per thousand. In addition, each year the rates will increase based on the government set percent increase (for example this year it is 2.1%). This increase would be applied to the water rate only." The third reading and final adoption will take place at the next council meeting.
- 2. A community member raised the issue of junk vehicles. The council stated that no action may be taken until the nuisance order has been addressed in the ordinance revisions this spring.
- 3. Representatives from Waste Management presented the contract for the next fiscal year. The contract will not increase unless there is an increase in the tonnage of garbage if everyone does not recycle. It was suggested to the council that all residents be required to use the 32-gallon cart or the 96-gallon. The smaller option would replace the current bag option. This will be finalized in March. Recycling will be changed to the 4th Tuesday of every month.
- 4. An inquiry was made regarding the FEMA program for Fertile in regards to flood insurance. The city currently does not participate in the FEMA program. More research is being conducted at this time.
- 5. Yaggy Colby stated that they are beginning the investigation process of the infiltration and inflow issue. Yaggy expressed concern regarding drain tile interconnecting with the sewer system. A cross connection possibility will be further explored. In addition, they suggested a sump pump monitoring program for the city. Current requests are being made for inspection reports during the initial construction period.
- A budgetary work session was held to begin addressing the 2001-2002 budget year. A special budget meeting will be held on February 20th.
- 7. A motion to pay the January expenses was made.

It Was A Gas ©Neil L. Kuns September 13, 1995

When I was a child almost everything Dad did in his garage business seemed fascinating and wonderful. There were times, of course, when the job was dirty or dangerous, and I stayed safely at a distance. My mechanical bent must have started bending from watching him work. I thought he could fix anything, and most of the time he did. I loved to watch the sparks fly when Dad was grinding steel or sharpening a blade on the high-speed carborundum wheel grinder. Occasionally he neglected to wear safety goggles, and a small bit of hot steel would burn its way into the surface of his eyeball. I cringed when he told how the doctor had to chip out the metallic intruder from his eye.

Sparks also flew when he used the acetylene torch to cut through a steel bar or plate. He turned on the valves on the gas and oxygen tanks, lit the torch, balanced the flame to a fine blue cone of fire and started heating the metal to be cut. When the work piece glowed bright orange in the flame the oxygen lever increased the amount of that gas to the flame, and it began to burn through the metal. Iarger than those which flew off a grinding wheel

In the mid '30's compressed acetylene gas in tanks was not yet available. The gas had to be made by adding water to dry calcium carbide granules. Dad used a pressure pot specially made for this purpose. The ingredients were combined and the lid was quickly clamped on. The pot resembled a large pressure cooker with valves and a gauge. Gas formed as the water and carbide interacted. When the pressure was high enough Dad opened the acetylene valve on the welding torch and lit the escaping gas. This gas burned with a black smoke until oxygen was blended into the mix, when it became a cleanburning blue flame.

Any bottled gas lasts only so long. Both the tall green-painted oxygen tanks and the acetylene pot emptied as the gas was consumed. A gas dealer from Mason City called at Dad's garage regularly. He picked up the empty oxygen bottles and replaced them with full tanks. Low pressure readings on the gauges gave fair warning that a change was imminent. Fair warning was necessary when it came time to clean out the acetylene pot. The residue was a muddy tan mess and it smelled bad. But, as they say, someone had to do the job. It came with the territory if you were using acetylene. Some time in the late '30's the gas dealer began to sell acetylene in tanks. When that day arrived the shorter black acetylene bottles replaced the mix-it-yourself process. It may have cost a little more but it was a lot more pleasant to merely replace a tank than to clean out an acetylene pot. That was definitely a gas!
