CITY COUNCIL NEWS

The Fertile City Council met March 5, 2002 at 7:00 PM in the Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Tad Miller, Tammy Hall, Tanya Olson, Richard Bruns, Jeff Berg and Tom Kirschbaum. The February minutes were approved . 1st Bruns 2nd Miller. Neil Sletten of Winnebago Cooperative Telephone presented WCTA's plans to update the underground telecommunications cable, conduit and handhole facilities in the town of Fertile. The work will begin in April, 2002 and will be done by Moorehead Electric of Moorehead, Minnesota. A resolution granting WCTA use of public right of way and existing easements was passed. 1st Berg, 2nd Hall. A lengthy discussion about the community center took place. The roof and several walls are in need of repair. Olson and Miller will get estimates to repair building.. Chris Diggens of NIACOG explained the Flood Plan to the council. A public hearing will be held in May on the new ordinances. A bid was reviewed to trim trees in the park. It was decided to obtain more bids. The Emergency Plan Resolution was discussed, no action was taken, it will be placed on the April Agenda. It was moved by Hall, 2nd by Berg to hire Yaggy-Colby to help implement the DNR Sewer Plan. Passed. Dave Low attended the meeting to meet the new council. A scale is needed at the water plant, moved by Miller, 2nd by Hall. Passed. The expenditures were approved . Berg 1st, Bruns, 2nd. Passed. The buidget hearing will be Thursday, March 7, 2002 from 6:30 to 7:30. Miller moved, Hall 2nd to Adjourn.

A Ten Dollar Bill Neil L. Kuns April 6, 1994

Sometime between yesterday afternoon when I received it and this morning when I was filling out a bank deposit slip I lost a ten dollar bill. Where or how it happened I really can't tell. Of course, that's the way it is with *anything* we lose, isn't it? If we *knew* we were going to lose it we would be more careful. There *is* one location at which I can look, but it will be some time before I can return to that place.

One afternoon fifty-two years ago I was walking home from uptown. When we lived *east* of the business block we went *up* town. After we moved to the west side we always went *down* town. Don't ask me for an explanation. I don't have one. But, as I was saying, I was on the way home on the south side of Main Street, looking at the street as I walked. Between the Post Office and the Cozy Nook Cafe I spotted a ten dollar bill lying next to the curb. No one was around so I picked it up, put it in my pocket and wondered whether I should keep this amazingly good news to myself. After discussing this with my parents we decided that since these were very difficult times the money *should* be returned to whoever lost it *if* we could determine who that might be.

The ladies at the central telephone office not only made connections between callers and "callees," they were also a central clearing house for all sorts of vital and sometimes privileged information. We decided to tell them that I had found some money on the street, in case anyone should inquire of them.

The next day or so Norman Jorgensen visited our home, and said he understood I had found some money. After I told him I had he asked if it were a ten dollar bill, and I admitted it was. By that time I knew it was his, and that I would return it to him.

"You really should have it all, since you found it," he said.

While I silently agreed, I knew that a ten percent reward would be more reasonable.

"I'm going to give you two and a half dollars for finding it. Would that be alright with you?", he asked.

I told him that would be fine and when I tried to thank him he refused, saying, "No. Thank *you!*" It was more money than I had ever received in one lump up to that time, and I guess both of us were happy with the way the lost and found turned out.

These days professionals may make not ten, but one hundred dollars *an hour*, not a day. In those days anyone who earned ten dollars a day was extremely grateful, remembering well the time, not *too* many years past, when a job that paid ten dollars a week was good if you could get and keep it.

The most notable aspect of this narrative is the quality and decency of life in small town America of the early War years. We've all heard defining stories of small town life, but for a man to lose a ten dollar bill and to recover it several days later from the one who found it would never happen in an American city today.

Science in Education from North Dakota State University in Fargo, ND in 1968. He also took seminary work at Fuller Seminary, Pasadena, CA and Luther/Northwestern Seminary in St. Paul, MN.

Joseph and Silence Seglem were married June 9, 1940 in the Seglem home, Joice, IA. They started their married life and ministry together serving churches in Aitkin and Big Fork, MN. They also served churches in Brooklyn, NY, Huxley, IA, Chicago, IL, West Union, IA and Pasadena, CA. In 1957 they moved to Fergus Falls where he served as President of the Lutheran Brethren School until 1972. He continued to serve on the LBS Faculty until 1987. They have made their home at 529 W. Alcott since 1958.
