#### THE ART COLLECTION

where she is a 29-year veteran All of the 114,000 teachers honored in this seventh edition were selected by their former students, who themselves are currently, or have been, listed in "Who's Who Among American High School Students" or on the national dean's list, publications which recognize the top 5 percent of our nation's high school and college students respectively.

"There is no greater honor teachers can receive than to be recognized by former students for their excellence and dedication, said Park Davis, publisher of "Who's Who Among America's Teachers. "In this publication we clearly have the best teachers in America selected by the best students."

## **Big Band Sound**

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Each generation has its favorite variety of popular music. My mother's was sentimental ballads, ala Bing Crosby and Kate Smith. My children like music with a beat and with guitars. My music of choice is the Big Band sounds of Glenn Miller, Benny Goodman, Harry James, and Tommy Dorsey, among others. (They don't have to have double consonants in their names to be appreciated.) Whenever I hear an old recording or a remake of one of the old "charts" I tune in emotionally, and anticipate every phrase.

I have written before about playing in the Fertile High School Band for seven years, and thinking about "big bands" reminded me of two events from my high school years. The first must have been about 1946, since Mr. Suker was the band director before Mrs. Wisty took over, and he was the one who manipulated my first memory.

We had gone to Garner for the Iowa State Band Contest. All of the soloists and groups had performed and had been graded. Our last entry was our concert band. There were never many more than eighty students in the entire high school during my four years, and the band couldn't have had more than thirty members. We took our places on the stage behind the closed curtain. It was customary to tune up the instruments, starting with James Oliver Sanderson, the lead trumpet player. Actually, he might have been the *only* trumpet player, since most of the horns were cornets. He was the best in the band. Mr. Suker told us to go through the sounds and motions of tuning up but not to change the pitch of *any* instrument, explaining that if we were slightly out of tune it would make us *sound* like a bigger band. He seemed to be content for us to sound bigger, rather than better. Perhaps he had given up on us sounding any better. Who knows? "Eroica" had never before sounded like it did that day in May.

The other incident I recall was repeated at least two years, as Evelyn Tweeten and her trombone, and I with my snare drum were invited to participate in the North Iowa Band Clinic in Forest City. Mrs. Wisty had nominated the two of us to be part of an all day festival in the near-by town. Mother drove us over to "For' City", and we stopped on state road number nine north of the Tweeten farm to pick up Evelyn. The band consisted of over 200 selected musicians from throughout North Iowa, and we totally filled the stage at the Forest City Auditorium. We rehearsed all day with the director of the University of Iowa band, and put on a concert that evening. That was a BIG BAND, and it sounded pretty good, even if we didn't do any Dorsey or Glenn Miller arrangements.

I still like big bands whether they are playing marches or swing. Musically, that's "home" for me.

## Cook's Corner



### Hot Cranberry Citrus Drink -

This is a good holiday drink and really easy to make.

1 package (12 ounces) fresh or frozen cranberries.

- 2 1/2 quarts water
- 2 cups orange juice
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup pineapple juice
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 3 cinnamon sticks [3 inches]

In a large saucepan, bring cranberries and water to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer for 5-7 minutes or until the berries pop. Stir in the remaining ingredients; return to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 25-30 minutes. Strain through cheese cloth; discard pulp and cinnamon sticks. Serve warm. Makes around 3 quarts.

>Put a dryer sheet in the clothes hamper with the dirty clothes. Eliminates the odors of dirty laundry. >Stick a dryer sheet in your tennis shoes, at night to eliminate odors. They'll smell great in the morning.

Eliminate static electricity from Venetian blinds with a dryer sheet. When you wipe the blinds with a sheet to prevent dust from resettling.
