Also present Tom Kirschbum and Terry McCarthy of Yaggy Colby. The minutes were declared approved as presented. McCarthy reviewed with the council progress on the 5 year Sewer Inflow & Infiltration Reduction Plan. The council and McCarthy will be dye-testing the sewer system November 18, 2002. The Community Center sale is targeted to be complete by November 15, 2002. The burning of leaves and yard waste has been extended to December 1. Berg moved, Olson 2nd to accept Nettleton's offer to p lace the rock along the south river bank in the park at no charge. The rock was donated to the town of Fertile by Basic Materials. Olson moved, Miller 2nd to hire Hare Electric to put up the Christmas street light decorations and remove them the first week of January. Passed. Tom reported the compost pile at the lagoon site is being abused. ONLY YARD WASTE AND LEAVES MAY BE PLACED AT THE SITE Continued dumping of other materials at the site will mandate the closing of the compost site. Please do not put any thing but yard waste and leaves on the pile so the citizens of Fertile may continue to have this service. Olson moved to approve expenditures, 2nd Miller.. Passed. Committee Reports were given.. Meeting Adjourned.





The Fertile City Council met January 7, 2003 at 7:00 PM in Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council persons Richard Bruns, Tammy Hall, Jeff Berg, Tad Miller. Absent Tanya Olson. Also present Tom Kirschbum, The minutes were declared approved as presented. Members of the Fertile Library Board gave a report to the council and made a request for the 2003-2004 budget. Fred Hare reported repair is needed on some of the street lights. The council will explore options to repair/update the street lights. The city council will have a special meeting to work on the 2003-2004 budget Thursday, January 16, at 6:30 PM at Fertile City Hall. A Resolution of Adjustment of Current City Budget was moved by Hall, 2nd Bruns. Passed. This is to implement the transition to the new reporting forms required by the state effective FY 2003. Budget requests were received from the Fertile Little League and The Fertile Fire Department. The Fertile Beautification and Improvement requested money be included in the park budget to landscape the ends of the walking bridge. Berg moved, Hall 2nd to order \$10,000 in materials to have on hand to repair the sewer system. Passed. Work will begin as soon as weather permits. Berg moved, Hall 2nd to make \$10,000 in street improvements this summer. Passed. Berg moved to approve expenditures, 2nd Hall... Passed. Committee Reports were given. Meeting Adjourned.

A Letter From Denmark

Neil L. Kuns January 21, 1995

My mother and father met at a church youth group in Forest City, Iowa. Dad lived near that town and Mom has always lived in Fertile, Iowa, fifteen miles distant. Perhaps it was to be nearer the one he loved that my father worked one winter for George and Agnes Nelson on their farm south of Fertile. A warm relationship developed between the older Danish couple and my parents which continued after my parents' wedding and well into my childhood. Dad called Mrs. Nelson "Ma" and my mother and I called her "Aunt Agnes" although we were not related. Agnes always mispronounced her "V's" so she called my mother "Westa," rather than Vesta. George had a tendency to be down and grumpy, but Agnes was always up and happy -- almost "chirpy," like a little bird. She was a generous soul, and liked to give Mom little gifts like glass vases or beads. My younger brother and I often received gifts of hard candy. We enjoyed visiting their farm.

Getting to their house was sometimes an adventure. Most of the country roads in the area were graveled, but the Nelsons lived north of a narrow lane off a rutted dirt road. In the summer months it was dusty, but soon after spring thaws or rains the fine black dirt turned into slippery gummy mud. It was a gooey mess! If the car wasn't steered into the right rut it could easily slide off into the ditch. Timing was everything in getting to Aunt Agnes' house.

During one visit to the Nelson farm in 1942 or '43 Agnes told us of having received a letter from Denmark. She had immigrated to Iowa from that tiny kingdom, and still had close family members living there. The Second World War was raging in Europe, and Denmark was occupied by the German army. The letter related how difficult living conditions had become and that it was an ordeal to find enough to feed the family. The letter read, "All the good food is gone." The next sentence was censored. Being both curious and resourceful Agnes tried to figure out what her relative had written which caught the censor's eye. Even though the words were **blacked** out Agnes was able to make them out by holding the letter up to the light. Her usually mild-mannered relative had written, "The damn Germans get it all."

Americans were also living with shortages and the rationing of food, clothing and gasoline. Some of the goods we usually would have enjoyed were scarce, and we had a hard time finding everything we wanted. Still the deprivations moved people to express discontent only when another family in town hoarded some scarce item such as sugar or flour. We all knew the commodities were needed for the war effort and everyone wanted the war to be won as soon as possible. That was one difference in attitudes toward shortages in occupied Europe and America. We were in sympathy with the efforts to win the war, but the Danes and other overrun peoples were not in sympathy with the Nazi regime which was waging the war. People are still willing to sacrifice for a cause with which they agree and are still quick to complain when they must forego personal comforts for a purpose with which they are not in sympathy.

We all felt sorry for but were unable to do anything to help the good folk who had written the letter from Denmark.

He enlisted in the United States Navy and served for four years as a medic.




PEANUT MALLOW BARS




