

The Fertile City Council met 7:00 PM in regular session, June 7, 2005, at Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Paul Youngers, Tad Miller, Gail Shropshire, Jeff Berg. Absent Melanne Bang. Milller moved, Shropshire 2nd to approve the May minutes. Jeff Berg moved to replace three red rasberry bushes for Mrs. Dan Lee. Miller second, passed. Ms. Lee stated she has received DNR ok for the work done in the river on her property. Mr. Lapointe, lawyer for PIM and Mr. Greves, lawyer for the City of Fertile discussed a solution for the Pop Machines and dumpster on the sidewalk on Main Street. A July 1st deadline was agreed to by both parties for a solution. Leon Hagen does not think he should pay for water/sewer because he is not receiving service. Youngers moved to table the issue of water bills to property not using service until Yaggy Colby returns the Sewer Study. Second Berg, passed. Dennis Johnson informed the council of a grant sought by the County for a bike trail. Each town would receive equal miles. The council expressed interest in the project. Miller moved to appoint Amanda Waddington to the Worth County Foundation to represent Fertile. Youngers 2nd, passed. Waste Management presented options in garbage and recycling. Miller moved to grant Keith Brcka a permit to put a drive from Main Street onto the East side of his property. Berg 2nd. Passed. Miller moved to retain Larry Pump to perform a City Audit not to exceed \$2,250. Youngers 2nd. Passed. Bruns reported the sheep are doing well at the lagoon, bridge approaches on south 1st street will be repaired when the B20 detour is removed. Youngers moved to authorize that the Little League erect an electronic scoreboard at the ball diamond. Second Shropshire. Passed. The sign was purchased with funds from grants and fundraisers. The Mayor reported the Bruns Brothers volunteered hours improving the ball diamond. The Wescom cable equipment has been abandoned and will be disposed of by the city. Individual cable stands marked with a red X may be removed from lawns. Burtness & Lundgren Plbg donated an used air conditioner unit and installation to City Hall. Water Tower Paint and Repair will delay the contracted painting until 2009. The Fire Department will do a controlled burn on the pile located behind the Kirschbaum property on West Washington Street. Youngers moved to approve expenditures, Miller 2nd. Passed. Since the City of Fertile assured Nettleton of payment when he knocked down the walls of the Fertile Gym during

the fire, and because he has not been paid, Youngers moved to make payment to Brian Nettleton, send a request of payment to the property owner and if payment is not received, place a lien on the propin the amount of \$413.00. 2nd Shropshire. Passed. Berg remarked on the need for clean-up on the Point. A discussion of ditch dirt removal on East Main was held. Youngers moved to adjourn, 2nd Miller. Meeting adjourned..

Finding Joy in Your Life


Happiness is how frequently you're happy, not how intensely.



Ride and Seek

I suppose every child plays some form of the game hide and seek. This usually starts with a mother and her baby playing peek-a-boo with a crib blanket. Babies put on a good show and act amused so as not to disappoint their mammas. When there are other brothers and sisters in the home the game grows with the family and in time fills every room of the house. Most kids have a favorite hiding place in their home, and may retreat to their site of solitude even if no one else is playing the game.


With a few years of growth children are permitted to play the game outside. They may go around the homes on either side of their own, but probably not across the street. In Fertile during my childhood the streets were nearly as empty as the yards in the daytime. After determining who was "it" for the first game, we ran and hid behind trees, bushes, sheds and shadows. "It" would count to one hundred while hiding his eyes, and then cry out, "Here I come, ready or not!" After this the first player spotted by "it" became "it" for the next contest. Those few stragglers who had hidden particularly well were called in for a new game with the phrase, "Alle alle otts (outs) in free!"

We called one variation of the game "I'll draw the frying pan. Who'll put the weenie in?" Our favorite place to play this game was in Larry and Madelyn Purcell's front yard by the towering cottonwood tree across from the old mill. One player faced the tree while another with his finger drew a circle (the frying pan) on his back. All the other players gathered around and one poked his finger (the weenie) into the pan. If the one who was "it" correctly guessed which child had touched him he was no longer "it." That role passed to the one who had been caught "putting the weenie in." The rest of the game was standard hide and seek.


By the time we were teenagers this *running* and hiding seemed a little juvenile. We were roaming all over town on our bikes by that time. Still, the idea of *hiding* and seeking still had a certain appeal, so we made up a new game, "ride and seek." The rules were about the same except that we could ride and hide anyplace in town. The only restriction was that we could not go into buildings or garages. The lumber yard with its many alleys and sheds became a favorite hiding place. Ranging over the whole town made the game easier but the fact that we also had to conceal our bicycles while hiding made it harder. Ride and seek took a lot more energy than hide and seek.


Before too long even our bicycles became too slow and children's games gave way to what we thought were more mature pursuits. Older boys either had their own cars or occasionally had access to their dad's cars. This changed the name of the game to "seek and ride." We went seeking for girls or other friends and then we went for a ride. Going for a ride was different than going to a place. We rarely knew where we were going while merely riding. The object of the game was seeking for something to do.


Today kids here in California either cruise back and forth on certain popular streets, or hang out at shopping malls. They are merely playing the latest version of "hide and seek." It is a game that will probably keep changing but go on as long as the youth lasts.

RHUBARB BUTTER CRISP Helen Humphrey

- 4 5 cups cut-up rhubarb
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1 egg
- 4 Tbsp. Butter

Combine rhubarb, 1 cup sugar and 3 tablespoons of the flour. Mix with the rhubarb, put in a baking dish. Beat egg with a fork, add 1 cup sugar and rest of the flour. Mix well. Sprinkle over rhubarb using fingers to distribute. Melt butter and drizzle on top.


Bake 350° until lightly browned and fruit is tender. Eat and enjoy and use any topping you like.


