

The Fertile City Council met 7:00 PM in regular session, May 3, 2005, at Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Paul Youngers, Tad Miller, Jeff Berg. Absent Melanne Bang, Gail Shropshire. Berg moved, Milller 2nd to approve the March minutes after amending. A lengthy discussion was held on the sewer and excess rain that is currently causing problems. The watertower inspection indicated the condition of the tower was good, the council is requesting a delay of two years before the scheduled painting is done. The original work plan was for the year 2007. Water tower inspection is done on an annual basis. The Lee complaint was discussed. Sandifer's water bill was tabled until the June meeting. The PIM/sidewalk issue was tabled until the June meeting. Monthly reports were given. The Fertile Fire Department received a grant for \$750.00 towards the purchase of a self-containing breathing apparatus. The grant from Iowa Network Services also included sponsors Winnebago Cooperativae Telephone Association, Fred Hare and Mayor Joyce Russell. The Water Quaility Report for the City of Fertile is available at City Hall and the Fertile Library. Youngers moved to approve expenditures, Miller 2nd. Passed. 

Fertile Volunteer Fire Department May 2005

The Fertile Volunteer Fire Department would like to update you on things that have happened in the past two months. In the month of March we applied for five grants to different organizations in and around the area. So far, we have received monies from INS Charity Grant program to purchase one Self Containing Breathing Apparatus. As of May, we have \$3,700.00 for bunker gear. We received monies from Tannahill's, Schissel, Waddington's and Novak's toward bunker gear. This will buy 2 ½ sets of bunker gear. Thank you for your gifts of money and to those who have donated in the past. Your support is greatly appreciated. Donations are still accepted.

Brian Fairchild has resigned from the fire department as of March 2005. Thanks Brian for your years of service on the fire department. Three of our firefighters finished an Instinct Command class held in the Hanlontown Fire Department twice a week for six weeks. It was also stated, all rescue calls are non - public information and "the right to privacy act" protects an individual. No firefighter can release any information to anyone without the family's permission. The fire department aided in several rescues and two fires since that last update.

As you may have noticed, we have replaced the red lights on the outside of the building and plans are being made to paint the fire department this spring. We have purchased a **thermal image camera** that will help the firefighters see hot spots, which are invisible to the human eye.



A GOOD REMEMBRANCE

My first years of school were in a country school house. It was a small, one room school house with two outdoor toilets out back. One was designated "Boys" and the other "Girls". There was one teacher (always a lady) and eight or ten students, depending on the size of the families on the tenant farms. The grades were from one to eight with frequently only one to a class. Our farm was about one and one half miles from the school by the road or about half the distance if we walked across the fields. The children always walked to school back then. I was only five years old at the time, but my two older sisters looked after me and probably even carried me if I whined enough.

One day in the very late fall, a sudden blizzard struck. There were no radios at the time, so there was no advance warning whatsoever. It soon became so bad we could scarcely see to the corner of the road which was only about 300 feet away. Our young teacher (only about 20 years old) was very concerned and did not know what to do. It was very apparent to her that she could not just send the children out into the storm to go home. We children thought it great fun and ran from window to window vatching the snow pile up into huge drifts. Just at the time, a big wagon pulled by two large horses appeared out of the snow. It was our father! He quickly put out the fire (a pot bellied stove) in the school and loaded everyone into the wagon. All children dressed warmly at the time, but our poor teacher always had to wear a dress and light stockings. Our father had thought of that and had a blanket to put around her and took her home first. We children huddled together in the straw in the wagon, protected from the wind by the sides of the wagon box. When the neighbor children had all been delivered safely to their homes, the snow was blowing so bad our father could not see at all. He just loosened the reins on the horses and told them to take us home. Then he got down in the box with us children. Our two faithful horses, Flory and Bess, wanted nothing better than to get home to their warm barn with plenty of hay and oats. After a bit we peered out over the wagon, and sure enough, we were coming up the long driveway to our house. Our father stopped in front of the house and let us out and then took the horses to the barn. We ran in the house and told our Mother about the fun that we had! Those were truly good times to remember with strong mily ties.

Nothing To Sniff At

Several months ago I bought a tube of airplane glue for some minor repairs I was making. It didn't seem to have the holding power I had remembered from childhood. What it lacked in stick it more than made up for in stink. The label explained that a noxious odor had been added to the formula to discourage young people from "sniffing" the glue. We used to joke about some people merely smelling the cap from a whisky bottle and becoming tipsy. In our innocent days of youth we smelled something only to tell what it was and if it was good or spoiled. Sniffing glue or any such thing to get a "high" was unheard of in those days. At least we hadn't heard of it in the hinterland. Today kids inhale aerosol paint propellants, computer component cleaning sprays, laughing gas and the like for whatever thrill it may give them. Regretfully, the thrill sometimes kills them, or cooks their brains, leaving them mentally impaired for life. What a pity. What a waste!

Working in a garage in the wintertime presented its hazards. Exhaust from a running car engine could make a person nauseous or worse. Carbon monoxide can kill you if it becomes concentrated enough. Dad devised flexible tubes that slipped over the cars' tail pipes and vented the exhaust to the outside. This helped immensely. Another activity in an auto repair shop that presented respiratory risks was painting a car. The preferred coating in the 1930's was lacquer because it gave a lustrous finish to a car when the job was done. In order to spray the lacquer on smoothly Dad had to dilute it with a thinner he called "banana oil." This solvent smelled sweet but was both toxic and flammable in high concentrations. Good ventilation was a must if one was to maintain good healthy lungs.

Smoke from either acetylene or electric welding was enough to make a worker wheeze or something worse. The smell of hot metal and melting flux didn't attract anyone. It was nothing anyone wanted to sniff. The welder had to stay there and take it, but he didn't have to like it.

Then there was the aroma of gasoline. When we pumped gas in those days the fumes from the tank were not recaptured, as is now mandated in California. Evaporated and spilled gasoline perfumed the area around the pumps. We were quite careful with this very combustible fuel around open flames, but because it cost only twenty-five cents a gallon, we were *not* very careful about spilling it elsewhere.

One day "Dickie" Peterson bought a penny's worth of gas at Rodberg's Station east of the mill. Whoever pumped the gas probably thought nothing about it. Maybe he wanted it to clean some grease off a lawn-mower or to burn some rubbish. The station attendant went back to work and young Peterson sat down on a bench in front of the garage. He liked the smell of gasoline and sat there sniffing it from his glass jar. Sometime later Dean Haugen happened by and said, "Hey, Pete. What are you doing?" Dean tapped him on the shoulder and he fell over, nearly asphyxiated by the fumes. Fortunately, he recovered and everyone in town learned a lesson from the scare.

Inhalants are nothing to sniff at. By that I mean we should take them seriously. Even the helium from a party balloon can be harmful if overdone. Breathing it from a tank can cause death by asphyxiation. One way to "keep your nose clean" is to watch what you smell.

SCALLOPED POTATOES From Nelda Halverson

1 stick butter 1/2 cup flour

2 tsp. Salt

1/4 tsp pepper

3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese

2 cups Half & Half

1 cup milk

3 cups diced ham

1 large onion (chopped

5 cups sliced potatoes

Make white sauce. Microwave ham for 1 minute and drain off liquids.

Fold in ham, onions and cheese into white sauce. Pour mixture over potatoes. 9x13 buttered pan. Cover with foil and bake at 350° for 30 minutes.






