

The Fertile City Council met 7:00 PM, April 5, 2005, at Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Paul Youngers, Gail Shropshire, Melanne Bang, Tad Miller, Jeff Berg. Berg moved, Shropshire 2nd to approve the March minutes. Jim Mendez of Waste Management informed the council about options for garbage, recycle and yard waste removal. No action was taken. The street lights on the business portion of Main Street are being replaced. Berg moved, Youngers 2<sup>nd</sup> to have Fred Hare remove the old poles and lights at no cost to the City. Mr. Hare will be given the poles. The lights belong to Alliant. Passed. Kathy Lambert of the USDA visited with the council about the requirements of the loan Fertile currently has with USDA for water and sewer. On her annual visit, she offered her expertise with reports and solutions Fertile is facing with water and sewer finances. Tom Steffany of 1st Gabrielson Insurance reviewed the insurance policy for the City of Fertile. Youngers moved, Miller 2nd to increase the coverage to \$2,000,000. Passed. Youngers moved, Shropshire 2nd to send notices to nine properties in violation of city ordinance. Passed. Tom Kirschbaum requested a permit to burn the pile located at 408 West Washington. Mr. Kirschbaum was referred to the Fertile Fire Department. Inspection of homes and businesses for sump pump violations is still in progress. Monthly reports were given. Youngers moved to approve expenditures, Bang 2<sup>nd</sup>. Passed. Miller moved to adjourn, 2<sup>nd</sup> Berg. Meeting adjourned. Burning of YARD WASTE ONLY is allowed for the months of April and May. A permit must be approved by the Fire Dept. and city council to burn material other than yard waste. Recreational fires are allowed. Building permits are available from City Hall or Tad

Businesses and Residences are required by ordinance to have numbers easily read from the street. Building numbers assist Emergency and Fire Departments and insure the resident prompt response to a call.



# Listenin' In On The Party Line

Telecommunications have come a long way since that spring day in 1876 when Mr. Bell spoke those immortal words into the first working telephone, "Mr. Watson, come here. I need you!" Today computers and the internet send messages around the world in a minute or less. Many homes across the nation have multiple phone lines for business, pleasure and even for teen-age members of the family. Telephone companies must add new area codes because all of the seven digit numbers in old areas are used. A rapid increase in the number of beepers and cellular phones is one reason for this explosion of demand for telephone lines.

Modern technology has not yet found a way to close the door on those who would listen in on cellular telephone calls. Some electronic eavesdroppers even steal the access numbers of legitimate callers and use them for their own personal or business calling. The more things change, the more they remain the same. Allow me to explain that statement.

In the 1930's telephones were a novelty just coming into use in rural northern Iowa. The companies were small independent cooperatives with limited resources. They had to extend the copper lines throughout the towns and countryside, as well as connect them to the long distance networks. To keep down costs while satisfying every family that wanted telephone service the companies devised the "party line." Several different homes or parties in the same area were connected to the same line. When one telephone was called, all other phones on that line rang. Each home had a different "ring;" two longs and a short; two shorts and a long, two short and two longs -- you get the idea. When their telephone rang one first determined if it was her signal. If not, she ignored the ringing. At least that was the plan.

It could get lonely in the house with no one else to talk to. The telephone afforded a way to relieve loneliness by calling a friend and to talking for as long as either or both had the stamina to stand. Early wall-mounted receivers required a caller to stand while using the line, and such conversations might last for over an hour. Another way to ease boredom or to satisfy ones nosiness was by listenin' in on the party line. One could pick up some hot gossip this way. Callers had to be careful as to what they said, especially if they heard the tell-tale click of another telephone receiver being lifted off its cradle. There was no other way to tell if the line was free to make a call, so hearing the click was not that unusual. When the first ones on the line heard only *one* click they knew someone else was still on the line. If a person had a nosy neighbor she might be so blunt as to tell the uninvited listener to get off the line.

Not everyone subscribed to the idea that privacy was a right of the first caller. Some thought they should be free to listen in on the line. Grandma Carr was eavesdropping one day when my Mother came into the room. Mom chided grandma for listening to another person's conversation. Grandma protested that she paid her telephone bill and had the right to listen whenever she liked. This was a novel concept and sounds a little like the "open-to-anyone-with-his-ears-on" conversations of c.b. radio operators of this day. It is not that different from those who intentionally listen in on cellular calls today. As I said earlier, "The more things change the more they remain the same." The nosy nature of people has not changed.

If you see pedestrians on the road, it's courteous to give them additional room if there is not on-coming traffic.

<u>Pedestrians:</u> Increase your safety and visibility. If you walk on the road, remember to walk against the traffic. If you're out when it's dark, be sure to wear light-colored clothing and carry a light.

Teresa Smith gave the Lesson for the evening on "Butterfly Gardens". She also had pictures and articles about butterflies...



<u>First Lutheran Church</u> is hosting a Life Line Screening on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>July 20</u>. Life Line Screening vill offer four different health screenings using Doppler color flow ultrasound:

- 1) A Carotid Artery Screening which looks for plaque buildup in the carotid arteries, which leads to stroke. (Up to 75% of all strokes are linked to carotid artery blockage);
- 2) An Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA) test which checks for an aneurysm (enlargement) in the abdominal aorta that could lead to a ruptured aortic artery. The majority of people who have an abdominal aneurysm have no symptoms and the mortality rate for a ruptured AAA is about 80-94%;
- 3) An Ankle Brachial Index (ABI) which screens for Peripheral Arterial Disease or PVD in the lower extremities. Peripheral Arterial Disease is a strong predictor for heart disease.
- 4) And a bone density screening, which tests both men and women for the early detection of osteoporosis.

Jou must pre-register by calling 1-800-324-1851. These screenings are completely painless, non-invasive, and each require ten minutes or less to complete. The cost is \$35-\$45 each or all four for only 129. This screening is being sponsored by Worth County Public Health.

# Lure of Quick Buck Costing some Consumers Big Bucks

Scam artists hitting lowa residents with counterfait postal money orders

DES MOINES – A fraud scheme making the rounds through Internet chat rooms and auction sites, in e-mail messages, and over the telephone is costing victims across Iowa and the Quad Cities time, money, and a not-so-pleasant chat with bank and law enforcement officials about passing counterfeit postal money orders.


According to Postal Inspector Linda Jensen, the counterfeit money order scam begins when a victim is contacted by someone through an Internet chat room or on-line auction site claiming to have financial problems or needing help to cash domestic and/or international postal money orders. "The person in need often claims to be living in a foreign country, but the scam artist can cook up the scheme from any location," said Jensen, whose office is located ir: Des Moines. "The scam artist is simply looking to recruit someone in the United States to cash the money orders and return the funds via wire transfer," she added.


U.S. residents are lured into the scam when they are told they can keep some of the money as a gift or payment for their help. Unsuspecting victims provide their home mailing address to the fraudster and are told they will receive a check or postal money order that they should deposit into their own bank account. The victim then is instructed to immediately send the money via Western Union or conventional bank wire transfer to a bank or person located outside the United States.


Victims learn the postal money order is counterfeit only when they attempt to cash it, or when their bank account takes a hit for the full amount when the bank refuses payment on the bogus deposit. Postal Inspectors warn: Most lures promising quick-and-easy money are cast by fraudsters. These scam artists can easily connect to a sea of strangers through the Internet and dangle promising treats, hoping someone will bite. Don't take the bait.


