

City Council Special Meeting Minutes Sewer Revenue Loan Public Hearing October, 3 2006, 7:00 PM, City Hall

1.) Call to Order

The Fertile City Council met at 7:00 PM in special session, October, 3 2006, at Fertile City Hall.

2.) Roll Call

Present were: Mayor Joyce Russell, Council Members: Melanne Bang, Jeff Berg, Gail Shropshire, Patrick Renchin, and Tad Miller, and City Clerk Eddie May.

Public Hearing 3.)

Mayor Russell opened the public hearing at 7:06 p.m. on the SRF (Sewer Revenue Fund) Loan and Disbursement Agreement. Miller asked how the cash-flow would be affected by an additional loan. May stated he would prepare a cash-flow projection for the next Council meeting. No other comments for or against the proposed loan were presented. Mayor Russell closed the hearing at 7:17 p.m.

4.)

Renchin moved and Miller 2nd, roll call vote was unanimous, to pass resolution 06-03-10: authorizing and approving a Sewer Revenue Loan and Disbursement Agreement and providing for the issuance and securing the payment of \$200,000 Sewer Revenue Bonds.

5.) **Tentative Start Date Set**

The project start date was set for Monday, October 9, 2006.

6.) Tree Replacement

Resident Dan Lee petitioned the City Council to fulfill their prior commitment to replace a tree which was fell during the bridge construction. The City Council authorized the purchase and installation of a replacement tree.

Miller moved, Bang 2nd to adjourn. Meeting adjourned.

City of Fertile

City Council Meeting Minutes October, 17 2006, 7:00 PM, City Hall

1.) Call to Order

The Fertile City Council met at 7:00 PM in regular session, October 17, 2006, at Fertile City Hall.

2.) Roll Call

Present were: Mayor Joyce Russell, Council Members: Melanne Bang, Gail Shropshire, Patrick Renchin, and Tad Miller, City Clerk Eddie May and City Maintenance Manager Warren Bruns. Absent: Council Member Jeff Berg.

3.) **Minutes Approval**

Correction is needed in regards to the last paragraph of the City Clerk's Report. It was printed that the Senior Citizens committee signed a CD over to the City for the Community Center Project. It should have stated that the Fertile Community Center Board signed over a CD to the City of Fertile.

Renchin moved and Miller 2nd to approve the September minutes with this correction. Motion Carried.

4.) Library Trustee Renewals

Dawn Millard and Karen Usher have renewed their terms as Library Trustees.

5.) I/I Reduction Project **Update on Progress**

Construction began today, October 17th.

 Blue flags and ground paint will be used for locating construction areas. Please leave the flags and paint as they appear.

Approval of Project Expenditures

Miller moved and Renchin 2nd, to approve project expenditures. Motion Carried.

6.) Discussion of a new utility fee structure

 iviay presented a cash flow projection for the sewer system, including the new sewer loan payments. It appears that the current rates will cover the additional payment requirements.

 Discussion continued for the water system and the landfill/recycling services. Projections show a break-even operational cash-flow for water, with no cash-flow for maintenance including the scheduled water tower painting. Projections show a net loss for the landfill/recycling cash flow.

• It was suggested that the garbage fees be raised from \$11 to \$11.50 and the recycling fees be raised from \$1.75 to \$2.25. It was also suggested that the minimum water fee of \$14.50 be maintained while the excess usage over the minimum 2000 gallons be raised from \$.0015 per gallon to \$.0035 per gallon.

 Public hearings will be held at the next two Council meetings to finalize the rates. All citizens who would like input into the rate structure are encouraged to attend. Written statements may be submitted to City Hall as well.

7.) Mayor's Report

Vandals have damaged a porta-potie in the park.

- Curb stops are being located and marked. Broken curb stops will be fixed during the sewer construction project. Costs of repairs are the homeowner's responsibility. Written notices have, or will be sent to the residents with broken curb stops.
- The water tower has been repaired. It was damaged in the electrical storms in August.
- The Library was also hit with lighting. The copier, computers, furnace and air conditioning unit were damaged. Insurance is paying for the repair costs above the deductible.
- The City has received two bids for floor covering for the new handicap accessible restroom in City Hall. The Council has asked for two additional bids to reflect the cost of new flooring for all of City Hall.
- City Council Member Melanne Bang submitted her resignation. The Council will appoint her replacement. Melanne had 1 year left on her term. Citizens who would like to be considered for appointment are requested to attend November's scheduled Council Meeting.

8.) City Clerk's Report

May presented the September financials

 May suggested the implementation of a GIS – Geographic Information System to compile and computerize the information gathered over the last few years in regards to the Sewer, Water, Electrical and Gas lines throughout the City. Miller asked for an estimated length of time for development and the costs associated with development. May suggested using a simplified version of GIS to curb cost and to ensure usability for non GIS personnel. May will research time requirements and costs.

• There were several utility payments that were returned to the City in September. The charge for NSF checks will be raised from \$7.00 to \$30.00 to recover costs associated with administrating NSF checks.

 USDA is continuing to request that the City refinance the current debt on the water and sewer systems. A representative from the City's bank has been contacted to begin the application process.

City Maintenance Report

The snow plow/sander is being prepped for the season.

- Bruns knows of a party who is interested in purchasing the current plow/sander. The City has budgeted enough to purchase a newer plow/sander this fiscal year. The Council asked Bruns to begin to look for a replacement.
- A seal on the sewage lagoon pump is going out. The cost of repairs will be approximately \$2000. The City also has a spare pump that is incompatible with our current system. It could be sold for an estimated \$1,000. The City has a compatible replacement for that spare which will cost approximately \$2500 to repair.

10.) **Approve General Expenditures**

Renchin moved, Shropshire 2nd to approve the expenditures. Motion carried.

11.) Other Business

 The FB&I Committee has enough money left from the anniversary celebration to install welcome banners on the new light poles on

- The FB&I Committee has requested that the City form a committee for the future Community Center.
- The FB&I Committee will be remodeling the current concession stand at the ball fields. They will knock out the existing equipment closets in order to expand the concessions area. They will also

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





Movie Starring Fertile!



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First Postolities in Featile

Mail Service Was Begun by W. Rhodes

FERTILE-The history of the Fertile Postoffice has been brought to light by old newspaper elippings and from talking to old residents who can recall many of the postmasters.

William Rhodes, founder of Fertile, came here from Rosco, Ill., on Aug. 6, 1856, stopping in Ma-son City, which was a small town at that time. He came on to Fer-

tile and settled down by himself in the wildnerness, but soon other men began to arrive and build log cabins, too.

Rhodes and his neighbors walked to Mason City, a distance of 14 miles, for their groceries and mail.

Rock Postoffice

In 1861, Rhodes named a postoffice which was established on the old Dan Watts farm which was previously the old farm home of Gabriel Pence, who later became Rhodes' father-in-law. He christened the place the Rock Postoffice and Pence was the first postmaster.

Rhodes and Pence were not commissioned postmasters, but they were permitted to keep mail in their homes until the neighbors could call for it. The mail at this

was carried from Mason City to Bristol and Rock was served on this route. Pence served in this capacity during the Civil War.

People of Fertile at this time paid \$1 a week to get their mail every Saturday. Efforts were being made to get an office established here, but with no success. Was Ignored

· About the year 1868, Rhodes was traveling on a train when the postal clerk on the train began to electioneer him to support his old comrade, H. O. Pratt, for re-election to Congress. Rhodes emphatically opposed the election of the candidate. He said he would do all in his power to defeat him.

Rhodes said he had asked Pratt again and again for postal service and he had been ignored.

A week later citizens in Fertile received notice that a postoffice would be established at once with William Rhodes as postmaster, but this did not develop.

After a while the weekly distribution of mail was dropped. In 1872, a caravan of Norwegians from Mount Horeb, Wis., arrived and among them was Ole Ouverson, Fertile's first postmaster. He is an uncle of the present post-

master, Mrs. C. E. Eikenbary. After establishing a general store in the west side of town, arrangements were made with the government to establish a postoffice in Fertile and Ouverson was appointed and commissioned from Washington, D.C. Business must have been slow, for he sold 81 cents worth of stamps. The families the postoffice served were few, but many came long distances for their mail.

Another Ouverson Ouverson had charge of the postoffice until 1875, when he was elected clerk of the Worth County court. He sold his store to A. A. Grove and William Kirk. Grove became the second postmaster and continued in that capacity until 1892. During these years, the teceipts ranged from \$96 to \$150

a year, showing a small but steady increase.

Dr. N. W. Phillips succeeded Grove and during 1892 and 1893 the receipts doubled.

During the last administration of Grover-Cleveland, Halvor Ouverson received the appointment as postmaster and the office was operated by his daughter, Olena Elthon, as acting postmaster from 1894 to 1898 with a continuous gain in postal receipts.

Next in line came Will Winter who accepted the office in May,

Jessie Brown, later Mrs. J. E. Vincent, now Mrs. Orin Winters. In 1893 the postoffice was

turned over to Peter Grove, who served in that capacity one year, when he resigned to accept the first rural mail route out of Hanlontown after the Chicago Northwestern Railroad was completed through that town.

James Kirk was appointed to fill this vacancy and served for six years when he and his family left for South Dakota with several other families to accept govern-ment land. Oscar Rholl succeeded him:

Stage Coach

In 1914, Charles E. Eikenbary, a former teacher accepted the postmastership and served for 30 years, the longest of any previous

postmaster. At the time of his resignation, his wife, Anna, took the civil service examination, received the appointment on Oct. 1 1944, and is still serving in that capacity.

The story of the Fertile Postoffice would not be complete without telling about the stage coach which served this community for many years. The carrier came once a week, then twice a week

and finally every day. In June, 1902 the government allowed the town two mails a day. The morning mail was brought here from Hanlontown by the rural carrier and in the eve-ning by a mail messenger de-livering outgoing mail to the train and bringing mail back

Star Routes

Dersons diving in the 20th century can scarcely appreciate their advantages, but much has changed since William Rhodes walked to Mason City for the mail. Now citizens walk across the street to the postoffice.

The first postoffice fixtures were made by the first postmaster, Ole Ouverson, and a desk is still being used by the

present postmaster in sorting the outgoing mail.

All fixtures were owned and the postmaster mitil 1950 when the government supplied the office with a steel safe, 54 new lock boxes, a sorting table, a filing cabinet, a lobby desk, a sack rack and a rural delivery desk

There are two star routes serving the Fertile Postoffice. One originates in Mason City and ar rives here at 7.a.m. each day and the other originates in Pertie and meets the Mason City state route truck at 7 a.m. The mail is changed from one truck to the other with one going north to Kiester Minn, and the Mason b City one going on to Bancrott I Both trucks return in the evening a and exchange mail. That gives e the fown two outgoing mails each i day and two incoming mailes each day.

This is a far cry from the stage! coach service and the Rock l Postoffice.

Bill is survived by his wife Jarlyn (Ouverson) Upchurch of Colo; three sons and two daughter-in-laws, Perry and Nancy Upchurch and Lindsay Upchurch, all of Colo and Kendall and Sue Upchurch of Zearing; daughter, Julie Upchurch of Coralville, IA; ten grandchildren and, six great-grandchildren. He is also survived by four brothers, Byron Upchurch of the Philippines, Bruce Upchurch of Des Moines, Barry Upchurch of Nevada and Brent Upchurch of Colorado Springs, CO; sister, Betty Arnold of Portland, OR. Bill was preceded in death by his parents and one infant brother, Bradford Upchurch.

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CHILDHOOD ON THE FARM

THE RED BICYCLE

In the spring of 1939 when I was 8 years old, a kind neighbor gave me 10 duck eggs. I took them home and with the help of my mother put them under a setting hen to hatch. Hens always had an urge to hide their eggs and raise a family in the spring of the year. They would hide their nest, lay about a dozen eggs and set on them until they hatched. Then they would proudly appear with their brood of chicks. It was no problem, therefore, for us to find an old hen willing to devote her time to hatching my duck eggs. We put her in an old brooder house and I faithfully fed and watered her until the baby ducks appeared. Then she was allowed the freedom of the farm and raised all of her ducklings.

I kept all of the hens and the next February got a drake to go with them. They started to lay and soon I had over 100 duck eggs. You had to take the eggs from them each day or they would quit laying and hatch the eggs. This time I had 8 hens to set the eggs, plus the five duck hens, so I soon became almost overwhelmed by baby ducks. They flourished that summer and I think I had at one time almost 120 half-grown ducklings!

About that time they became restless and started seeking water to swim in. The mother hens pleaded in vain with them to stop their foolishness, but they were determined. Every morning they would march single-file down to the farm pond and every evening they would return quacking loudly for their cracked corn supper. Soon, to my chagrin, I counted fewer and fewer each evening. The foxes and turtles had discovered tasty morsels and were rapidly ruining my duck herd. I finally shut the rest in a wire pen, much to their great indignation, and in the fall I still had about 30 ducks to sell.


I had no trouble selling them by putting a small ad in the local paper and soon possesed the enormous sum of \$12.00. With that money, I purchased a used red bicycle. This was the greatest bicycle I had ever seen. I quickly learned to ride by coasting it down hill and soon was peddling for miles on the gravel roads in the neighborhood. I learned one painful lesson early on. You do not ride with both hands off the handlebars on a gravel road.





Small round pretzels Melt some White Almond Bark Fill center of pretzel with Almond Bark and put a small M & M in the center.






