

City Council Meeting Minutes August 15, 2006, 7:00 PM, City Hall

1.) Call to Order

The Fertile City Council met at 7:00 PM in regular session, August 15, 2006, at Fertile City Hall.

2.) Roll Call

Present were: Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Melanne Bang, Jeff Berg, Gail Shropshire, Patrick Renchin, Tad Miller. Absent: City Clerk Eddie May.

3.) Minutes Approval

Berg moved and Shropshire 2nd to approve the July minutes. Motion Carried.

4.) Yaggy-Colby - City Sewer Project Update

Terry McCarthy gave an update on cost estimates for installing new manholes rather than repairing them. He left a copy of the project Manual for 2006 CDBG I/I Reduction Project. Yaggy-Colby is scheduled to send bids out this week..

Resolution #4 Prohibition of the Use of Excessive Force. Berg

moved, 2nd by Renchin. All approved.

Resolution #5 Provide for a Notice of Hearing on proposed plans and specification and proposed form of contract and estimated cost for the construction of the Sanitary Sewer collection system improvement project and the taking of bids therefore. Miller moved, 2nd by Berg. All approved.

7.) Liens Against Properties

Lein will be placed on 210 East Main for repairs on a water leak between the curb stop and the house on 12-1-02. The repairs were the owners responsibility. Repair costs were \$1150.00 + 8% interest over 4 years of non-payment = total lein of \$1518.00. Renchin moved, 2nd by Miller. All approved.

• Tree Damage in the Park and Ball Diamonds - Clapper Tree

Service and approximately 35 people came to help clean up, as the venders for our 150th celebration were to start setting up in the park in less than 24 hours from the wind damage. Thank you to everyone that helped.

The Water Tower was also hit by lightning in the sterm and took out the FAA lights on top of tower and electrical box on tower.

Hare Electric made an emergency repair to the light and a temporary fix to the electrical box. Parts are on order to repair this. Insurance will cover both the wind damage and lightning damage.

 Warren Bruns, City Maintenance Person, was burned by a fire explosion at the burn pile at the Lagoon. He suffered 2nd degree burns on both arms and his face. Please be careful as to what is put out there. He is getting better. Workman's Comp. covers this.



Do the people of Worth county have to put up with this kind of representation?



CORN HARVEST

A very significant part of the farm work was the corn harvest. Mechanical pickers were not used much until the late 1940s and until that time everything was done by hand. The equipment needed for one man to husk corn consisted of two horses hitched to a wagon with a square wooden box. The box would have several boards attached to the top of the right side. These were called bang-boards and the husker would toss the ears of corn at these high boards and they would drop into the wagon box. We wore a husking hood on the left hand and the husks would be stripped back, the ear snapped off and thrown into the wagon. Two rows of corn would usually be picked at once, alternating between hills, and the horses moved forward at intervals without being told. Great speed and proficiency was developed and the goal was always to pick 100 bushes per day per man. When you considered that the farmer usually had other chores to do besides harnessing and hitching the horses, this was a very high goal. Also, the load of corn had to be scooped off the wagon into the crib by hand. Any unlucky child or farm wife who could be recruited also helped and then often three rows would be picked at once.

The harvest usually started in late October as soon as the corn was dry enough to keep and they tried to be done by Thanksgiving. Many times due to bad weather or other delays, it would not be completed until Christmas.

A legend in my family concerns my great grandfather, a rugged individual who always shucked corn bare handed. He had several sons and as they all worked together. On one particulary cold day, he rapped his hand on the steel wagon rim. On finding his hand was frozen, he said to his sons "well, boys, I guess we will quit for the day!"



TEMPER

There once was a little boy who had a bad temper. His father gave him a bag of nails and told him that every time he lost his temper, he must hammer a nail into the back of the fence.

The first day the boy had driven 37 nails into the fence. (
the next few weeks, as he learned to control his anger, the
number of nails hammered daily gradually dwindled down. He
discovered it was easier to hold his temper than to drive those
nails in the fance.

Finally the day came when the boy didn't lose his temper at all. He told his father about it and the father suggested that the boy now pull out one nail for each day that he was able to hold his temper.

The days passed and the young boy was finally able to tell his father that all the nails were gone. The father took his son by the hand and led him to the fence. He said: "You have done well, my son, but look at the holes in the fence. The fence will never be the same. When you say things in anger, they leave a scar just like this one. You can put a knife in a man and draw it out. It won't matter how many times you say 'I'm sorry', the wound is still there."

A verbal wound is as bad as a physical one. Friends are a very rare jewel indeed. They make you smile and encourage you to succeed. They lend an ear, they share words of praise and they always want to open their hearts to us.

FERTILE GARDEN CLUB


The Fertile Garden Club met Tuesday, September 12th, at the Church of Christ for the annual Guest Day. Members answered roll call by introducing their guests.






Born Donnabelle Mullenger in Denison, Oscar Award-winning actress, Donna Reed, started her career at the young age of 16.......

- —Glenn Miller, noted trombonist and orchestra leader, was born in Clarinda, located in southwest Iowa.



- —Iowa is the only state whose east and west borders are 100% formed by water. The Missouri and the Mississippi Rivers.






