ity Council Meeting Minutes uly 17, 2007, 7:00 PM, City Hall

.) Call to Order

The Fertile City Council met at 7:00 PM in regular session, June 19, 2007, at Fertile City Hall.

.) Roll Call

Present were: Mayor Joyce Russell, Council Members: Jeff Berg, Loren Hoffman, Patrick Renchin – 2nd half of the meeting, Gail Shropshire, City Maintenance Manager Warren Bruns and City Clerk Eddie May. Absent was Council Member Tad Miller.

.) Minutes Approval.

• Berg motioned and Shropshire 2nd to approve the June minutes. Motion Carried.

.) Alliant Energy - Franchise Fee Options

- May reported that a number of the metro cities in Iowa have opted to impose a Franchise Fee on non-city owned utilities. The fees are placed against utility usage and collected by the utility company. The fees are then used by the cities to subsidize their General Fund – *Library, Little League, Fire Department, Ambulance Service, Police Service, Parks, etc.*
- The City's 25 year contract with Alliant Energy is currently up for renewal. May suggested that the council consider placing a small fee (.0025) in this year's contract so that the option can be available anytime within the next 25 years.
- Rich Mengas and Rebecca Gisel from Alliant Energy attended the council meeting to offer their advice. They mentioned that one city within our area has opted to add the fees.
- The consensus of the council was to keep the contract as it is now, without the Franchise Fee option.
- The City will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, August 14, 2007 at 7:00 at City Hall in regards to the 25 year contract with Alliant Energy.

.) City Security Cameras

- At the request of the Council, May presented two initial proposals for camera and security equipment. The proposed equipment would monitor the ball fields, Rhodes Island Park, and Main Street. The video from the feeds would be maintained for up to 2 months and would feed directly to City Hall and to the Worth County Sherriff's Department. Any illegal activity captured though the system would be burned to DVD and used if legal action were to be taken.
- The system would be funded through grant monies.
- The council requested that May investigate additional equipment vendors, the installation costs and to verify maintenance costs and warranty information.

.) Tom Kirschbaum

- Tom requested that the City investigate why the water he drains from his spring is backing uphill into his neighbor's property.
- Warren will investigate and notify Tom and the Council.

.) Mayor's Report

• Within the first two weeks after installation, a giraffe leg has been stolen from the kids' playground. The City is replacing the leg as it exists to protect kids from the bolts below.

- 2th Street, River Street, State Street and Park Street will receive all new black top with monies from the sewer project. Heartland asphalt will be moving in their equipment and starting the road repairs this week.
- The city is receiving two more bids for the blacktopping of the remaining roads in town. The City expects to be able to replace 3-4 roads per year over the next 3-4 years.
- Two homes within City Limits have been turned over to the attorney for failure to comply with safety ordinances. The homes had previously received letters requesting their compliance to the ordinance by June of 2007.
- The City is garnishing the wages of one resident for failure to pay past water bills.
- This fall, two 4 year Council seats and the Mayor's 2 year seat are up for election. Interested candidates may register and receive information at City Hall between August 27th and September 30th.
- The City purchased 8 picnic tables from the City of Hanlontown. The tables are currently in the Park.
- A BIG THANKS TO HAUGEN LAWN SERVICE for donating the time and materials to spray the ball fields, and along the north river bank!
- Buck and Joyce Russell trimmed the trees and weed whacked at the water plant and in the park.

8.) City Clerk's Report

- · May presented the End of Fiscal Year financials.
- May suggested the creation of a new "Administrative Allocation" account in order to allocate shared expenses that are too time consuming to allocate during the year between funds. May assured the Council that this is a typical, and legal, accounting tool.
- Hoffman moved, Renchin 2nd to approve the creation of an Administrative Allocation Account. Motion Carried
- The final report will be published in the Forest City Summit as well as posted at the Library, Post Office and the Downtown Café'. The full report will be available at City Hall.
- Hoffman moved, Berg 2nd to approve the expenditures. Motion Carried.

9.) City Maintenance Report

- Bruns reported that the burn pile has been completely cleaned up at the lagoon. He also mentioned that Waupaca Woods is in the process of offering branch shredding more will be announced when it is ready.
- The dike in the Park is in the process of being sloped by Bruns and Nettleton Excavating. This will allow for easier maintenance. Dave Haugen has agreed to seed the dike once it has been completed.
- Bruns requested the approval to purchase a set of forks for the skid loader. These will allow the City to move picnic tables and other large objects as necessary.
- Renchin moved, Shropshire 2nd to approve up to \$500 for the purchase of forks for the skid loader. Motion Carried.

10.)Committee Reports

• **Parks** – The tree stumps in the center of the park are going to be pulled out and/or ground. The stumps along the river bank cannot be removed as they are part of the system holding the river bank in place.

 Weeds & Garbage – The County Weed Inspectors are presently working with residents to clean up the noxious weeds within City Limits.

11.)Next Meeting

• The Fertile City Council will meet at 7:00PM in regular session, August 14, 2007, at Fertile City Hall.

12.) Adjourn -- Hoffman moved, Shropshire 2rd to adjourn. Meeting adjourned.

EARLY FAMILY CARS

My father loved cars, and though we coule not afford them, I cannot remember not having one. My first recollection was a 1927 Studebaker, which would certainly be a collector's item today! It was a heavy monster of a thing and probably one of our most reliable. It served faithfully for several years, but finally even my father admitted it was done for. It had no brakes and the forward gears kept dying until all that was left was reverse.

Since he could scarcely drive it to Fertile backward (he had plenty of problems even going forwards) he decided it was time to retire the old beast. Since we were behind with the field work that year and did not own a tractor, he hit upon the idea of hitching the old car to the plough and speeding up field work. The plough was a 1 bottom sulky plough on three steel wheels with 2 adjustment levers and a foot pedal you tripped to bring it in and out of the ground.

He fastened it securely to the car bumper with a log chain. My brother, Herbert, drove the car and my father mounted the seat of the plough. We all gathered in the field to watch the great time-saver. Herbert started down the row and my father lowered the blade. The car promptly stalled out. "You must go faster!" my father yelled. Herbert obediently started the motor and took off again. The same results occurred and by this time my father was very angry!

"Get her going and keep her going," he shouted angrily. So Herbert took off as fast as the car would go! Unfortunately, the plough was not made for such great speed! It went sideways and tipped over, throwing my father into the loose ground. My father gave up and went back to his three horses for ploughing power!

Our next family car was a 1929 Erskine. It was built by Studebaker and served us well. In the meantime, Herbert had gotten his license and bought a 1930 Model A Ford. The main thing I remember about it was that the only heater It had was a little door that opened into the engine compartment. Coming home from Mason City one frigid February evening, we nearly froze. The car also froze the radiator and we had to stop at a farmhouse to thaw her and us out.

By that time, my father drove a 1935 Plymouth with suicide doors. I remember the door flying open and me falling out on the gravel. We were not going fast so I was not hurt except for a few scratches. When I was 15 and got my license, I persuaded my father to buy a 1936 Oldsmobile, a real luxury car. They foolishly let me drive to ball games and school events. I had the vain hope that some girl would consent to ride with me.

Joice Dumpster Site to Close August

31.2007

The Worth County Board of Supervisors have decided not to renew the permit for the Joice dumpster site location. Those residents that use that facility will be directed to use the dumpster site north of Worth County Lake @ 4281 Quail Avenue. From Kensett drive north on Highway 65, turn right (East) on 430th Street, Turn right (South) on Quail Avenue, drive 1/8th of a mile and the Worth County Lake Dumpster Site will be on your left (East side of the road). All residents will have to use this dumpster facility until the new Citizens Convenience Center is completed this fall @ 4125 Pheasant Avenue. From Kensett drive east on 410th Street about 1 mile until you get to Pheasant Avenue. Turn left (North) and the new facility will be located on the right (east side of the road) about ¼ of a mile. Rural curbside recycling will be still picked up at the regular pick up dates until the new facility is operational, then residents will be required to haul their recyclable goods to the new Convenience Center. 2 eggs

1 cup sugar

1 cup flour

1/3 cup melted butter or margarine 1-1/4 cups Ocean Spray Fresh or Frozen Cranberries 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350° Grease an 8x8 baking pan.

Beat eggs in a medium mixing bowl until thick. Gradually add sugar, beating until thoroughly blended. Stir in flour and melted butter. Blend well. Add cranberries and walnuts. Mixing gently just until combined. Spread evenly in pan.

Bake for 40 –45 minutes or until golden brown and toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Cool and cut into bars. Makes around 16 servings.
