

#### 2.) Roll Call

Present were: Mayor Joyce Russell, Council Members: Jeff Berg, Loren Hoffman, Tad Miller, Pat Renchin, Gail Shropshire, City Maintenance Manager Warren Bruns and City Clerk Eddie May.

### 3.) Minutes Approval.

• Miller motioned and Renchin 2nd to approve the September minutes. Motion Carried.

### 4.) Mayor's Report

- Joyce is still working with the D.O.T. to replace the title for the fire truck so it can be sold.
- Pluckett's Pest Control sprayed City Hall.
- The City paid Chuck Waage for the damage caused by the City's parade float.
- The City passed a State Audit which was required for the CDBG funding. The auditor claimed that we were 2<sup>nd</sup> easiest audit he has ever completed and the 3<sup>rd</sup> fastest. THANKS to Simmering-Cory, Yaggy-Colby, Brian Nettleton Excavating, Joyce, Warren, Eddie and the Council.
- The Worth County Sheriff's office has been investigating recent vandalism of private and public property. Any information would be appreciated.
- Renchin motioned and Berg 2nd to approve the purchase of necessary security cameras up to \$800.00. Motion Carried.
- Waupaca is now accepting 3" diameter branches, grass clippings and leaves. Stop at the office and talk to Chris prior to dumping.


### 8.) Next Meeting

The question of a Library Levy will be put on the November 6, 2007 city election ballot. This levy would raise 27 cents per \$1000 of assessed valuation (taxable value). This would be a yearly increase of \$8.10 on property assessed at \$30,000; \$13.50 on property assessed at \$50,000; \$20.25 on property assessed at \$75,000 and \$27.00 on property assessed at \$100,000. This would raise about \$1147 that would go directly to the library. The money will be used to keep up with the many changes in technology, rising cost in books, postage and other materials, staff and a growing demand from our patrons for more services. Our library is a unique and valuable resource and an investment in our future. All successful investments require attention, time & resources to remain valuable and to grow. 






### FARM TECHNOLOGY



Every machine my father owned was either broken down or about to break. Therefore, he was constantly fixing things to the farm work done. We had no bailing wire or duct tape, so nis main repair kits contained used Prince Albert tobacco cans and binder twine. He also used copper rivets to fix harness and the grain binder canvasses.

Fixing the 6-foot grain binder was a yearly ritual that usually lasted several days. My father would pull the binder up underneath a large shade tree and repair it as best he could with materials at hand. Things that were purchased at the local implement store were sickle sections, copper rivets and wooden slats for the canvas and sometimes knotter parts. Occasionally he would buy a whole new canvas and the old one would be used to repair the other two

The binder was drawn by three horses and cut the oats with a sickle, transferred the straw up a canvass conveyor and tied it into neat bundles. Then there was a bundle carrier, which could be tripped at intervals for the oat shockers to set up in neat rows. If the oats was standing straight, weed-free, and the grain binder was in good repair it was a simple operation. This rarely happened for my father.

Sometimes it was o hot the horses had to be rested frequently. Weeds would get in the canvas and tear off the wooden slats. The complex knotter that tied the bundles would not work properly and required adjustment. Since only 5 to 10 acres could be cut in one day it was a long and stressful ation!.

He was united in marriage to Judith Draves on Sept. 6, 1992 at Zion Lutheran Church in Clear Lake.


Fred enjoyed fishing, reading, volunteering, visiting with family and friends, and music, especially playing the violin and harmonica.

### Sandies by the Sea

2 cups all-purpose flour

1/4 tsp salt

1 cup unsalted butter (softened)

2/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 large egg

1 cup pecans, toasted and very finely ground (using a food processor)

20 Caramel candies

3 Tbsp. Cream or whole milk

1 cup chocolate morsels

2-3 Tbsp. Large crystal sea salt.

1. Combine flour & salt in a bowl; set aside.

2. In a mixing bowl, cream the butter & sugar until light & fluffy. Add the egg & vanilla; beat to incorporate. Add dry ingredients in batches, mixing between each, & then stir in the ground pecans. Cover & chill dough 1 hour or until firm.

3. Preheat oven to 350°. Line baking sheet with parch-

ment paper or butter the sheet.


4. Roll the dough into 1 inch balls. Place on baking sheet at least 1 inch apart, & depress a cavity in the center of each ball using your thumb or rounded implement. Bake for 13-15 Minutes or until the bottoms are brown & set. Check halfway through baking to see that the depressions are still deep enough to fill, if not, use a floured spoon to redefine.

5. Remove from oven, let them sit for a few minutes on

the sheet. Transfer to cooling rack.

6. Melt caramel candies & cream together in a saucepan over low heat. Fill the center of each cookie with approximately 1/2 tsp. of the caramel. While the filling is still warm, sprinkle centers evenly with the sea salt & let sit until firm.

7. Place chocolate in a sturdy plastic bag in a bowl, heat in microwave on medium for 30 second intervals until melted. Cut a small hole in corner of bottom of bag & drizzle melted chocolate across each cookie. Allow cookies to sit until chocolate has become firm.






