ensued with the young men setting out by wagon across Minnesota, hoping to sell it in Chicago, but returning when they received word their ownership of it was questioned.

A second piece was found on the A.A. Pingrey farm, four days after the landing. Pingrey gave it away, and the neighbor who received it sold it to the

University of Minnesota.

The Estherville meteor is the largest, and from a geological standpoint, most important of the meteors that have landed in North America.

There are two pieces of the meteorite on display in Estherville.

A meteorite center is just west of the sign proclaiming "Estherville

Meteorite" on the southwest intersection of Highways 9 and 4. One piece is located in a building connected to American Family Insurance at 814 Central Avenue.

A second piece of the meteorite is on display in the the lower level of the Estherville Public Library, located at 613 Central Avenue.
